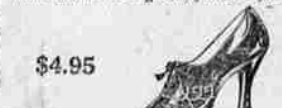

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 6.—Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss sent the following note of congratulation to Governor-elect Julius L. Meier:
"Heartily congratulations and welcome you to Salem. You have achieved a splendid victory and I anticipate for you a most successful administration. If there is any service my department may render you as governor-elect, please feel free to call on me."

SENATOR METCALF WINS RHODE ISLAND BATTLE
PROVIDENCE, Nov. 5.—Rhode Island remained in the republican column today after one of the closest political battles in her history. On the face of returns from all but one of the state's 222 election districts, United States Senator Jesse H. Metcalf, republican, will return for another term in Washington with a lead of approximately 2,000 votes over his democratic rival, former senator Peter G. Gerry.

With him will return republican congressman Clark Burdick from the first district and Richard S. Aldrich from the second district, both of whom were re-elected by comfortable margins. The third district, elected Francis B. Condon, democrat, to fill an unexpired term and also a full term.

OKLAHOMA DEMOCRATIC ON LEADING OFFICES

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 5.—Oklahoma had returned today to its status as a democratic commonwealth as reports from Tuesday's general election continued to pile up the convincing lead of the party's candidates from United States senator down to minor state offices.

The state continued its unbroken habit of electing democratic governors and for the first time in a decade, both of its United States senators in 1931 will be of the democratic faith.

W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray secured a sensational triumph over Ira A. Hill, republican state senator Murray's lead, if continued in the proportion it held when two thirds of the votes were counted, would finally total about 100,000, and unprecedented majority for Oklahoma gubernatorial candidates. Hill conceded his opponent's victory early last night.

Thomas P. Gore, blind man whose eloquence echoed through the senatorial chamber from 1907 to 1920 when he was repudiated by his party because he was branded an obstructionist to the world war policies of President Wilson, returned to state favor in a triumph over Senator W. R. Pine.

Majority in the house of representatives has apparently been reduced only a few votes and the overwhelming dry majority in the senate not at all.

The board, however, commented that the election showed a lack of efficient organization among the drys in many parts of the country "a state of affairs which calls for immediate consideration."

Scanning the returns, the board said while the "wet Mr. Bulkeley" won the Ohio senatorship, "the dry Mr. White" was chosen democratic governor. Senator Hastings' defeat of former Senator Bayard in Delaware was described as a dry victory as was the defeat of Senator Stock "a mild wet," by Rep. Dickinson in Iowa.

Only Wet Area Won
"The defeat of Mrs. McCormick and of Mr. Tuttle," the statement said, "show clearly that it is suicide for the republican party to give aid and comfort to the wet cause in nearly any northern state. The wet reforming victories were in distinctly wet territory."

Taking an opposite view of the significance of election returns the federal dispensary tax revolution league, an organization sponsoring a nation-wide convention meeting here December 8 to agree to prohibition modification plan, said today all but 16 of 160 candidates it sponsored were elected.
