

OPINIONS ON TAX MUDDLE ASKED OF ATTORNEY GENERAL

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 6.—With assurance that the state income tax has been approved by the people, the state tax commission today submitted to Attorney General Van Winkle three questions whereby the commission will be advised whether it should proceed immediately with collection of the income tax or wait for several months. The questions arise from the fact that the income tax measure, passed by the 1929 legislature, and then subjected to the referendum, was passed by the legislature to be effective as of January 1, 1929.

The first question is whether the tax is collectible on 1929 incomes, as were the excise and intangibles tax acts, or whether the referendum nullified it completely pending the vote of the people. It may be possible, the commission believes, that the tax is not collectible until 1931, and then only on 1930 incomes.

Since it has been held up until the second half is due, the question put to the attorney general is whether the tax commission should now collect only the first half on 1929 incomes and give an extension of time on the second half, or whether it should collect both halves now.

The third question is whether, assuming that a tax on 1929 incomes is collectible, the commission should collect it now or wait until next spring and collect on both 1929 and 1930 incomes at the same time.

TOOZE DENIES GUILT OF LIQUOR CHARGE

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—Walter L. Tooze, Jr., Portland attorney, charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition act, pleaded not guilty in federal court today. The charges, based on an indictment against 36 alleged conspirators, included manufacture, possession and sale of liquor in ten Oregon and three Washington counties.

ROSEBURG STREETS ARE BEING MARKED

The task of marking the city streets has been undertaken by the street department with new equipment recently furnished by the city council. During the past few months the council has been considering various ways of providing street signs, and decided to place markers on the curbs at the intersections. Stencils were secured and are being used with spray guns to place the names of the streets in black letters on orange background at each intersection. The work is to be carried on until all the improved streets of the city are marked.

UNIFIED AIR CODE AIM OF STATE AND FEDERAL PARLEY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—With 44 state legislatures convening early next year, the federal government will campaign for unified air laws as an aid to aviation.

A conference called by Secretary of Commerce Lamont will be held December 16-17 in Washington between representatives of the government of all the states and the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce.

The federal government will present its plan against overlapping legislation as a potential danger to civil aviation and seek for uniformity and simplification of federal, state, and municipal air laws, regulations, and practices.

Discussions will be based on five subjects. They are: A uniform basic regulatory state air law; adoption of federal air traffic rules by the states for purposes of local enforcement; methods of local enforcement; state enabling acts for airport acquisition and control; and importance of uniform airport field rules.

The outcome sought is an agreement on the most advantageous division of powers or control between the states and federal authorities.

Included in the conference, to present the opinions of those outside governmental officialdom, will be delegates of the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce, representing the aircraft industry, the United States Chamber of Commerce, and the National Aeronautic association.

Acceptance of federal licenses for aircraft is one of the methods of the department of commerce to do away with duplication of effort in the various states.

At present, 29 states require federal licenses for all aircraft and airman. Nine states require federal licenses for those engaged in commercial flying and seven require either a state or federal license. Six states require state licenses only. The remaining six have no laws covering licensing.

WOODCOCK DENIES HAVING ASSERTED HOME BREW LEGAL

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 5.—Amos W. Woodcock, director of prohibition enforcement, told reporters here in reply to their inquiries that recent published reports quoting him as saying it is not unlawful to manufacture beer and wine in the home for home consumption were "absurd."
"I never made such a statement," he said, "because home manufacture of any beverage containing one-half of 1 per cent of alcohol is illegal and is specifically prohibited by the national prohibition act."
"What I have been trying to do is to direct enforcement activities against commercial violators of the law and liquor trafficking on

large scales, which are much simpler propositions than watching homes. I have instructed the agents to stop the traffic at its source and leave the maker of home brew to deal with public opinion and education."

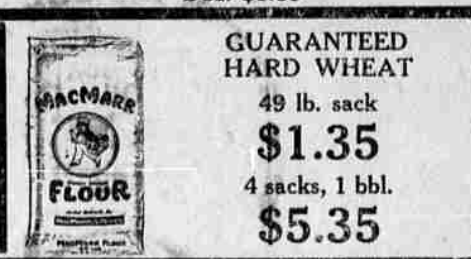

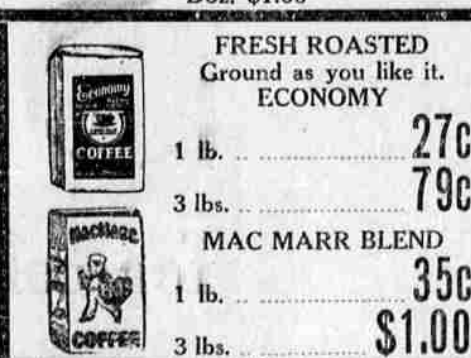
