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HAWKS SETS NEW RECORD IN N. Y. TO HAVANA FLIGHT

HAVANA, Nov. 7.—Cuban airman believed today Captain Frank M. Hawks, who broke the record yesterday in New York and dined last evening in Havana, had set a record for flight between the two cities which will be hard to beat.

Setting out from Curtiss field, Long Island, at 8:50 a. m., Captain Hawks, who holds most of the major American long distance speed records, flew southward along the Atlantic seaboard, and crossing to Cuba from the Florida peninsula, arrived here at 9:11 p. m., 9 hours and 21 minutes after his departure.

He estimated that, allowing for a 25-mile headwind, he averaged almost 132 miles an hour for the trip, for which he used a small mystery monoplane bearing the name "132." His actual flying time was 9 hours and 35 minutes. There were two stops enroute, one of 23 minutes at Jacksonville and one of 20 minutes at Miami.

He beat by nearly 5 hours the previous record of 14 hours, set March 5, 1928, when the late William Stultz flew here with Charles Levine and Miss Mabel Boll in a non-stop trip in the airplane Columbia.

Hawks said he probably would return to New York Saturday and might attempt to establish a new time record on the return flight.

ISRAEL DEFEATS MARS AND MARCUS TROUNCES BENNETT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—Able Israel, Portland flyweight, demonstrated his superiority over Bobby Mars, San Francisco Filipino here last night, when he defeated the latter for the second time within three weeks. Able won decisively in their second encounter, sending Mars to the floor for a count of seven in the fifth round and leading thereafter.

Joe Marcus, Portland lightweight won over Leonard Bennett, Milwaukee, Wis., in six rounds, despite a handicap of seven pounds in Bennett's favor.

Billy Church and Johnny La Rose, welterweights, fought a fierce four-round re-match. La Rose put Church down twice in the first round and Church dropped La Rose in the third. La Rose won the decision.
