DOUGLAS county is fortunate in one respect. There is far less unemployment here than there is in other parts of the world. The census figures revealed an unemployment here of less than two per cent. This percentage is perhaps a little larger at this time of the year but even so we are not badly off.

Two percent unemployment, however, presents a problem and one which we as ordinary average intelligent citizens should be trying to solve.

We should begin with at least one rule in attacking this problem: Take care first of those who are actual residents of our county. We could never hope to take care of and employ all the transients who come along. There are many men who live here and who have families which must be taken care of, who are not getting enough work to do to make ends meet. These are the folks who should be employed first.

Odd jobs will help solve this problem. All of us have little things around our home or around our place of business which should be done. Not only must they be done sometime but we will not find time to do them ourselves. Putting off their doing will not save a cent. Neglect, in fact, often increases the final cost.

Here is another thing and it applies more particularly to those folks who own income property. We shall shortly have need for all of the houses in Roseburg. The houses in best repair and condition will be first rented and at better prices. Would it not be a good plan to accomplish a needed repair to our small percentage of unemployment at this time by making the needed improvements and repairs to property that will be in demand within the fairly near future?

If you have a bit of work that needs doing, do it now. There will never be a better time.

RATIFICATION of the income tax bill by the people means the final approval by popular vote of the income tax principle as a means of lessening the property tax burden. The specific tax bill voted upon is in all probability unconstitutional upon the same grounds the intangibles tax was declared invalid, because of discrimination. Any attempt to collect the income tax will of course bring a suit to test its validity, and because of their experience in failing to secure a refund after paying the intangibles tax, people will refuse to pay the tax until its legality is established.

It will be up to the legislature to revise the taxation program, instead of three separate bills, the intangibles, the excise and the income, all should be combined in one harmonious measure, a general income tax bill covering all incomes. Before its final passage, the legislature should authorize the supreme court to pass upon its legality in an advisory manner and thus insure its validity and avoid litigation that spells confusion.

us to see the world there is every reason why it SHOULD interest us.

THE department of commerce announces that in the death registration area of the United States, which means those states in which causes of death are registered, accidents in which automobiles were involved caused 20,331 deaths in 1929.

The death registration area includes 95.7 per cent of the total population of the country, and if the same death rate holds true in the area where causes of death are not registered it follows that automobile accidents were responsible for 30,565 deaths last year.

That is a frightfully heavy toll. If the recent earthquake in Italy had claimed that many lives, the whole world would have been shocked deeply.

HEIR is something to think about. The outstanding cause of fatal automobile accidents is CARELESSNESS, in some form or other.

If drivers of automobiles would be just a LITTLE more careful, all the time, the number of deaths due to automobile accidents could be reduced amazingly.

Talks on Health

A POPULAR notion, long believed by everybody, is that suffering from rheumatism are good weather prophets. Recent experiments made by scientists of the Mayo Foundation appear to prove this age old theory.

How often have we all heard somebody say: "I feel it in my bones that it is going to rain." But just why this should be true has never really been solved.

According to a report made to the American Medical association a short time ago, the Mayo investigators studied, over a period of a year, 367 patients suffering from arthritis or rheumatism. The study was undertaken to determine whether there was actually any relationship existing between rheumatic pains and the changes in the weather.

It is reported that for more than 90 per cent of the time the experiments showed a relationship between stormy weather and an increase in the pain. During 72 per cent of the time the patients seemed to suffer more pain as the barometric pressure fell. During a rise of pressure they experienced relief. For 21 per cent of the time the curve of pain ascended as the barometric pressure descended, and vice versa.

There were included in the experiments observations on the humidity, temperature and atmospheric electricity. It was thought that these factors working together would cause the weather to change, or might have some effect.

It is well known how restless birds and animals are before a storm. They seem to have a foreknowledge of approaching bad weather long before there is any sign of it in the sky. Seagulls often come far ashore before a storm. Migratory birds are on the wing at such a time. Hogs bed themselves down and cattle seek shelter long before a change in the weather is noted by man.

Treatment for Rheumatism
Rheumatism and many other diseases cause the nerves to be particularly sensitive. In bad weather the low barometric pressure, which has its effect on the free action of skin and a consequent lessening of the escape of water from the body, sets up a nerve irritation. The perspiration is lessened, and on this account probably the rheumatic pain increases.

Person who suffer from rheumatism should keep the bowels freely open. They should be moderate in eating and drinking and avoid alcoholic drinks. They should lead a simple, regular life.

Local treatments of dry heat, stimulating liniments, electricity and judicious massage will help the rheumatic pains. But as rheumatism is, directly or indirectly, a germ disease, the only real cure is a clearing up of the seat of the trouble. It may be infected teeth, tonsils, or adenoids, or from the toxic poison in the intestinal tract. There are many causes for this condition.
