BORAH ADVOCATES SOVIET WELCOME

BOISE, Idaho. Nov. 10 — The machinery of peace is already formed and it remains only for a forceful worldwide public opinion to enforce it, Senator William E Borah declared in an address here

Borah declared in an address here last night.

The senator addressed an audience made up of several Boise church congregations, on the subject of Russian affairs. He reviewed all efforts toward peace in the last twelve years, restated his view shat Russia should be recognized by the United States and described a change in the attitude of this country toward South and Central American republics.

Of peace efforts, he said the treaty to outlaw war was the greatest since the birth of Christ. It sets up the machinery for spreventing war by providing means of settling disputes, he said, and at the same time encourages concerted national public opposition to military conflict.
