VETERAN RECITES EXPERIENCES IN ARGONNE FOREST

A talk on personal experiences in the Argonne forest at the time of the signing of the World War armistice was presented at the Kiwanis club noon luncheon today by Walter Fisher, Mr. Fisher, serving in the Ordnance department, was situated on a hill overlooking the forest when the war ended at 11 a. m. on the 11th of November, 1918. ORANGE, N. J., Nov. 10.—Sidney Morse Colgate, 68, chairman of the Colgate-Palmolive-Peet Co., died today at his home. He was one of the founders of the Colgate company. A genius for organization, he placed Colgate at the head of the worldwide organization which in recent years grew out of the original corporation bearing his name. To the same quality was ascribed his service during the World War as chairman of the war service commission of the soap industry. Colgate was a graduate of Yale in 1885.

DO-X Reaches England
CALSHOT, Eng., Nov. 10.—The giant German air liner DO-X completed the second leg of her flight to the United States landing at the Calshot airport today.

The passenger ship came down on the waters off Calshot after making a four-hour trip from Amsterdam where it had been waiting for favorable weather conditions for the past week.

Visibility was good and the wind was moderate as the great ship, carrying 17 crew members and 23 passengers descended on the water.

FOURTH AIRPLANE. TOTAL OF 11 MEN LOST IN CANADA

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., Nov. 10.—Eleven men and four airplanes were missing in northern British Columbia today while Pacific Northwest aviation interests girded themselves for a concerted attack upon the wilderness strongholds that had swallowed them up.

The latest additions to the list of missing were two Royal Canadian air force seaplanes, dispatched Saturday from Comox, Vancouver Island, to this point to search for Pilot Robin Henahan and two companions missing since October 28, when they left Vancouver, B. C., for Adlin to look for Pilot E. J. A. Burke, who had not been heard from since October 11.

The planes were piloted by Flight Lieutenant L. R. Phinney and Flying Officer C. R. Dunlop, with a crew consisting of Sergeant A. H. Warner, Corporal W. C. Atwood and Corporal M. Squire.

It was believed the planes would be able to make a safe landing in one of the sheltered spots along the coast, in case they were forced to stop.

Gasoline Taxes Pour Millions Into Funds for Schools, Highways

The 48 states and the District of Columbia collected an average tax of 3.39 cents a gallon on 6,899,863,976 gallons of gasoline during the first six months of 1930, according to reports received and compiled by the bureau of public roads of the U. S. department of agriculture. After deducting certain exemptions from the total assessed tax, the net tax on the sales of gasoline amounts to \$230,600,455. Under the tax laws, certain special fees, amounting to \$381,644, also were collected, making a total of \$230,982,099.

Based on the ratio of the number of gallons taxed in the first six months of 1929 to that year's total, and on the figures for the first six months of 1930, the amount of gasoline likely to be taxed for the current year is estimated by the bureau at 15,400,000 gallons. Figuring the taxes on the same basis and allowing for changes in tax rate, the total for the calendar year 1930 is estimated at \$215,000,000.

After deducting collection costs of \$995,719 from the tax receipts for the first six months of 1930, the states distributed the remainder as follows: \$157,390,770 for construction and maintenance of state roads and \$44,894,169 for construction and maintenance of county roads; \$14,862,154 to apply on state and county road bonds, and \$12,820,287 for miscellaneous purposes, such as town and city streets, public schools, seawall protection of roads, inland waterways under state departments of commerce and navigation, and other conservation.

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ANNUAL OREGON O. S. C. GRID CLASH SET FOR SATURDAY

Kitzmiller, Although Hurt in Battle With Uclas, Expects to Be in U. of O. Lineup.

Staters Given Even Break Because of Showing in Game With Cougars, Coast Leaders.

EUGENE, Nov. 10.—Johnny Kitzmiller, star Oregon halfback and contender for all-American honors, who was taken out of the Uclas-Oregon game Saturday with a twisted ankle, will be in the game this week against Oregon State. It was announced here today that Kitzmiller was injured in the third quarter after he had galloped 61 yards through the Bruin line and led the offensive all the way for the university eleven. The twisted ankle was not the one he broke last year in the game against Oregon State, and trainers said he would be in good condition by Saturday.

The state championship contest this year will be played at Corvallis, and will be the last game of the conference for Oregon, and for Kitzmiller, who graduates next spring. Oregon so far this year has been undefeated, thrice beaten, in a higher light, while Oregon's not impressive 7 to 0 victory over the Uclas did not boost its rating with football followers.

The state football rivalry between the two institutions dates back to 1894, and the teams have met each year but three since that time. Oregon has won twenty of these contests, Oregon State eight, while six were tied. The game will be the feature of Oregon State's homecoming program.

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LARGER ACREAGE OF STRAWBERRIES IN 1931 INDICATED

A report from the bureau of agricultural economics indicates that the acreage of strawberries intended to be harvested in Oregon and Washington in 1931 will be 18,550, or 5 per cent more than in 1930, 8 per cent less than in 1929, and about the same as in 1928.

"Beds are reported in excellent condition with adequate plants for fall and spring setting. Indications are that plantings in the fall of 1930 and spring of 1931 may increase the 1932 bearing acreage by 8 to 10 per cent over the 1931 acreage."

The preliminary estimate of production of strawberries in Oregon and Washington in 1930 is only 20,297,000 quarts, or 30,097,000 quarts in 1929 and 23,820,000 quarts in 1928.

The total acreage of late strawberries including Oregon and Washington intended for 1931 was estimated at 45,830 acres compared with 45,190 in 1930, 46,220 in 1929 and 44,840 in 1928.

The intended acreage of early, second early, intermediate and late strawberries combined is estimated at 162,050 acres or about 3 per cent less than in 1930. Practically all of the decrease is accounted for in the second early and intermediate groups of states, mostly in the second early group. It would appear, therefore, that the decrease would not particularly improve the market outlook for late strawberries to be produced in Oregon.

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
