

ROSEBURG PARENTS URGED TO CALL ON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

In the observance of National Education week a most cordial invitation is being extended to all parents to visit the Roseburg schools Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. It is felt by the school officers that parents should know more about the actual working conditions of the schools and the environment provided for the pupils, as they can thus assist their children in a better way to success in their educational efforts. Parents are urged to visit the schools on the days named and secure first-hand knowledge of the methods and conditions of operation.

Education week is devoted to developing helpful ideas concerning school work and activities. The United Parents association of Greater New York schools has compiled a list of hints for parents, some of which are as follows:

Arrange the breakfast and lunch hours so that there is no rushing at home or to school.

Encourage punctuality and regular attendance, not permitting trifles to interfere.

See that the children are dressed neatly, simply, modestly, and suitably in accordance with the weather.

Insist upon children under fourteen having at least ten hours' sleep.

Find out how much time should be devoted to home work, and see that it is done.

Provide a quiet place for home study, with good light and ventilation. Prevent interruptions as far as possible.

Show an interest in the children's school work, athletics and other activities.

Visit the classroom during American Education Week, and at other times, for a better understanding of conditions.

Do not criticize the teachers or school at all within the children's hearing. Always hear both sides of every question and ask the teacher about it.

Instill in the children habits of obedience and respect for authority.

Picture the school as a happy, desirable place, rather than as one children should dread.

Keep in mind that the schools offer unlimited opportunities to those who take advantage of them.

Plan to meet other parents in the school. It will help you understand your children better. Mothers should arouse the interest of fathers in the school activities and get their cooperation. If there is a parent-teacher association in your children's school, join it. If there is none, will you form one? Intelligent cooperation brings splendid results to all.

OREGON GETS RECORD TAX ON INHERITANCE

SALISBURY, Ore., Nov. 10.—A check covering the inheritance tax on the estate of Frank E. Smith, of Portland, the largest inheritance tax ever paid in Oregon, was received today by State Treasurer Kay. The amount paid was \$226,541.16, this being the net tax or about 95 per cent of the gross payment. The appraised gross value of the estate was \$239,175.78.

Prior to this time the inheritance tax paid by the Henry Pitcock estate held the record as the largest ever paid in the state. This was first received in the amount of \$228,089.36, but later a refund of \$38,708 was made.

NEXT CONGRESS FOR PEOPLE—C. C. DILL

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 10.—The next congress "for going to be a congress for the people," said Senator C. C. Dill of Washington at his home here today, "and if the president wants to come along, that will be fine."

"However, in my opinion it won't be a congress that will take orders. President Hoover must pay attention to the people."

It will be the duty of the democrats "to present a legislative program, with particular reference to economic conditions," he said.

"The balanced congress will not fight the president. However, we don't know what is on President Hoover's mind, and therefore can't say to what extent his program will be supported."

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Even if W. L. (Young) Stribling, Georgia's flinty pride, did wish to appear on the milk fund card in New York next month, the Chicago stadium would not hear of it.

Stadium officials yesterday informed Stribling—although he had not even asked—that they could not release him from his contract to meet either Gerald Ambrose (Taffy) Griffiths of Sioux City, Ia., or Paulino Uzcudun, in the stadium December 12 on a charity card.

Stribling had been suggested as an opponent for Jack Sharkey who had offered to fight the southerner for nothing. Stribling asserted, however, he is willing to meet the Boston sailor any time, either in Chicago or Miami.

CHINESE CIVILIANS DIE IN AIR RAIDS

PEIPING, China, Nov. 10.—Despite cessation of hostilities elsewhere between the Nanking government and the old northern military alliance, Nanking airplanes have continued their raids on Tai-yuanfu, Shansi.

Dispatches from Shansi civil say that more than 50 civilians were killed by bombs there November 8. The chairman of the provincial government has telegraphed Nanking urging cessation of the raids for the sake of the inhabitants.

16th company Columbia. John A. Buchanan, one of Roseburg's attorneys, who had given many years of service to the national guard, was the captain and commanding officer of the company. First Lieutenant Russell C. Dunham was second in command, with Second Lieutenant John Kern completing the contingent of officers.

The company was given hard training until in October, when the outfit was moved to Astoria to do guard work.

Agitators Battled
The Hammond mills in Astoria were at that time cutting spruce for American airplanes. The timers were being taken out of the Oregon and Washington woods and were taken to Astoria to be rough cut and were prepared for shipment to San Francisco. I. W. W. agitators were stirring up much trouble and there was a constant succession of strikes, sabotage, etc., resulting in curtailment of the output of the mills and the constant danger of damage to the mills and equipment. At the same time three shipyards were in operation under similar conditions.

As Captain Buchanan was the senior national guard officer, the Roseburg company was assigned to the task of guarding these mills and shipyards, and in October relieved a company from the regular army that had been guarding the plants. This duty, a most monotonous and disagreeable task presented some hard work at the outset. The strikers were constantly creating trouble and several clashes occurred in which the guardsmen were forced to resort to gunfire and bayonets to enforce order. Finally, however, they gained control of the situation, and despite constant attempts to cause damage to the mills or to induce labor disorders, the work continued without interruption. Two additional officers, Lieutenants Jirak and Burleson were assigned to the company at that time.

Hardships Take Toll
The Roseburg company remained in Astoria until February, when they were relieved by the U. S. guards. The exposure encountered in that guard duty was unequalled overseas. The men were quartered for the most part in army tents that had been used on the Mexican border. At Astoria there is an average rainfall of 100 inches, and

during the winter the men were constantly exposed to wet and cold. It finally became necessary to provide relief because of the great amount of sickness, as more than half of the members of the company were in hospital. Casualties resulting from that assignment were as great as suffered by many overseas outfits, as several men died, a number of them contracted tuberculosis and others lost their hearing or suffered other effects of a permanent nature.

When the company returned to Fort Stevens, there were so many men ill that they were given two weeks' rest before being returned to duty.

By that time regiments were being formed for overseas duty and men were drawn from the Roseburg company for these new units. Most of them, because of their experience, were appointed non-commissioned officers, and no company in the state had as many corporals and sergeants among its original membership when the war was over as did the old 4th company.

The return to Fort Stevens marked the end of the old organization as an individual unit. As men were drawn for overseas duty, the places were filled with new recruits, until there was practically a complete change.

Old "Chow Line" Re-Lives

For several years there has been talk of getting the old company together again to renew acquaintances and talk over the days of war experience. No action was taken, however, until this year when a few of the men still residing in Roseburg got together and put out invitations. Victor McGill, sergeant in the outfit, now captain of the Roseburg machine gun company, was named chairman and took charge of arrangements.

Tonight at 6:30 fifty or more of the men who served in the original group will meet for a banquet, for which "messkitch" have been provided to contain the "dum." The old "chow line" will be revived and the cooks are even providing a menu of the old army rations, beans and goldfish. Following the banquet the evening will be given over to a general jollification, which the veterans expect to enjoy to the limit.

JANITOR SHOULD BE DEPUTY SHERIFF, GRAND JURY SAYS

A recommendation that the day janitor at the courthouse be appointed a deputy sheriff and assist in the care of the prisoners in addition to keeping the corridors of the building clean and attending to the lawn and heating plant, has been submitted to the county court by the grand jury. It is proposed that prisoners be used in the care of the yard, and that the janitor be provided with authority over them.

It was also recommended that the court purchase additional blankets for the jail.

The night janitor was charged with the task of cleaning the offices and keeping up heat for the jail and looking out for the safety of the building.

The court was also advised that bars should be provided for the windows of the clerk's vault.

It was also recommended that a sidewalk be built from the storage house to the main buildings at the county home that the capacity of the laundry be increased and other minor alterations made.
