Leedy reports, more than fifty new members have been added to the organization. No membership campaign is being made and the new growers have signed the association contract voluntarily, believing evidently that cooperative marketing offers the best opportunity to receive a favorable price this season.

The majority of the new members were obtained in Lane and Linn counties.

The association was formerly known as the Douglas County Turkey Growers, but the name was changed this year, and the marketing plan altered so that the association, now known as the Oregon Turkey Growers, can take in members in any part of the western half of the state. The organization is affiliated with the Northwest Turkey Growers, the association sponsored by the federal farm board, and has contact with the central group which is directing the turkey marketing activities for the member associations in the western states.

Herbert Boyers, former manager of the local organization, is now serving as assistant manager for the Northwest Turkey Growers, and is, through his present official position, assisting the local growers with their problems this season.

Cooperative Meets Favor

McKinley Huntington of Canyonville, who has been conducting turkey killing demonstrations at Hermiston, Redmond and Ploverville in eastern Oregon, and Hillsboro in Washington county, returned home this morning. He reports that he finds turkey growers very enthusiastic about the organization of the turkey industry in the Pacific northwest and he is expecting a big increase in membership in the associations being formed in the state in affiliation with the Northwest Turkey Growers. He states that the turkeys in eastern Oregon are maturing late this season, the same as in Douglas county. Mr. Huntington had to make his trip by train as his car was stolen a week ago from in front of the Roseburg federal building, but it was recovered yesterday, having been found abandoned by an auto camp north of Grants Pass. The machine was not damaged. It was brought back to Roseburg yesterday.

The game promised plenty of excitement for the numerous fans who were flocking to the field prior to the opening whistle.

The celebration is to close tonight with a dance at the armory at 8 o'clock. The dance will be preceded by a band concert on the streets at 7:30 o'clock.

subjects, at the Arch d'Triomphe in Paris, at the monument to the war dead in Lisbon, and in the hall of the league of nations at Geneva there was the reverent hush of homage.

Even the roar of the man-made birds that ride the air between England and France was stilled in tribute. A British passenger plane, flying 2,000 feet above the fields of Kent, throttled its engines while its passengers stood bareheaded in their places for the two minutes of silence.

Germans Respectful
The captain and crew of the giant German seaplane DO-X, riding gently at anchor off Calshot, England, in waters where 12 years ago no German craft would have dared show itself, joined in commemoration of the end of the war.

They stood bareheaded on one of the ship's floats, the flag of the German republic flying at half staff behind them.

In Washington, there was tribute in Washington cathedral at the tomb of Woodrow Wilson, and President Hoover, after placing a wreath at the tomb of the unknown soldier, spoke before the good will congress of the world alliance for the international friendship.

America celebrated the day with exercises, parades and gatherings in city and hamlet with men of the army and navy joining.

Against a background of peace at Geneva Hugh S. Gibson, representing the United States, expressed to the preparatory commission on disarmament his country's unalterable opposition to any limitation of armament through a method of budgetary restriction.

Albert, king of the Belgians, laid a wreath at the monument to the war dead of his country and in nearly all of England coat lapels bloomed with a Flanders' poppy emblem, to aid the veterans' fund.

WAR AIMED AT MILITARY
FORCE, GEN. WHITE SAYS
SALEM, Ore., Nov. 11.—Memorial services for the World War dead, a parade and an address by Major General George A. White featured the Armistice day celebration here today.

Rather than placing all the blame for the war upon the German nation, General White said it could more correctly be attributed to militarism on the part of several nations, which he defined as "the habit of nations, or national groups, to vindicate by armed force their beliefs that they are the chosen people of God."

PLAN EXTENSION OF
POWER LINE TO SERVE

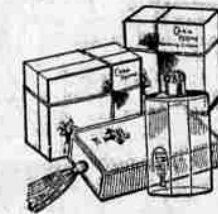
Mr. Fox came to Douglas county in 1905 and settled on a tract of unsurveyed timber land on the south side of the Umpqua near the edge of the Umpqua national forest. He constructed a fine log cabin, which has sheltered and provided hospitality for hundreds of fishermen and hunters during the past 25 years. He engaged in trapping on the Umpqua waters shed, running his traps chiefly on the upper waters of Canton creek and Steamboat. For two years he was employed by the government as a predatory animal hunter. Disliking "red tape" concerned in making out reports, Fox resigned the job and devoted himself to independent trapping. When wolves, coyotes or cougars annoyed any of his neighbors he was always ready to use his knowledge and skill as a hunter to relieve conditions and in this work he has saved thousands of dollars to stockmen and farmers of the county by voluntary and unremunerated labor.

He was an ardent sportsman and delighted in fishing. He was a friend to a great many fishermen who learned to know him for a kind, courteous and hospitable sportsman of the highest type.

His body was taken to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors and arrangements are being made for funeral services to be held at the I. O. O. F. cemetery Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
