

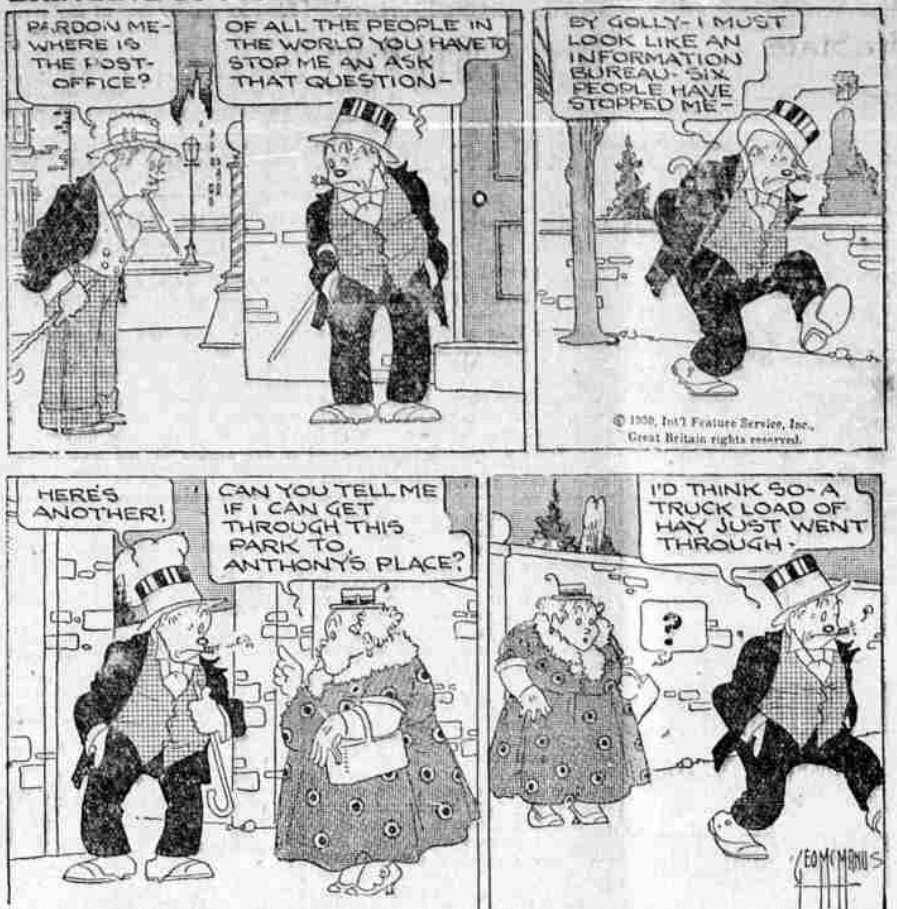

PROPOSED ROAD TO MEET NEED FELT FOR MANY YEARS

Elkhead, Shoestring Valley Districts to Be Brought Nearer County Seat and Oakland.

Road Will Extend Through Harvey Ranch, on Easy Grade; Initiatory Steps Taken

WOOD After seventy years of patient waiting, during which successive generations of the Aaron Harvey family have had to open from five to six gates each time any of them were compelled to make the trip to Oakland, only eight miles away, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Harvey, present owners of and residents on this Douglas county pioneer home, are to have a road opened up to and through their ranch, according to information obtained from interested parties. This proposed road will not only bring the Harvey ranch on the county road, but will bring to the doors of Oakland and Roseburg business men those residents of Shoestring and Elkhead, prosperous sections of the country only about a dozen miles from the former town, who have all the years since the country was settled been compelled to go from fifteen to twenty miles out of their way to reach either place. A story in this newspaper October 24 told of the conditions existing in this particular section of the county, and the need of an open road up Wheeler creek, starting at a point some five and a half miles from Oakland and extending through the Clark, Underwood, Harvey and Lamb ranches, a distance of about five miles into the Shoestring valley, making that part of the county, and Elkhead as well, tributary to Oakland and Roseburg. This piece of road can be built for the most part on a three per cent grade. At present the Elkhead and Shoestring ranches are compelled to go around by Conella, fourteen or fifteen miles out of their way, to get to southern county points. Most generally they are forced to keep right on going, traveling by the Lottage Springs route, north to Cottage Grove and Eugene.
