And they must train not only for a vocation, but also for an avocation and the wise use of leisure time. There are many problems yet to be worked out but the school of today has surely progressed far toward carrying out its seven cardinal objectives for each child, namely: the development and maintenance of high standards of health, the mastery of the fundamental subjects of a course, the fitting of the individual to a vocation so that he may be independent, training for worthy home membership, guiding toward good citizenship, wise use of leisure time and the molding of ethical character.
