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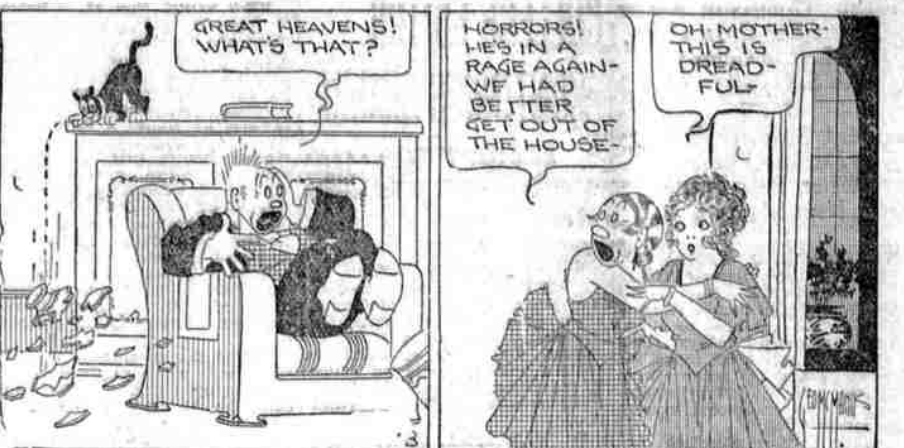

NO STAMPEDE OF CONGRESS IF BORAH CAN PREVENT IT

Senator Asserts Necessary Consideration Must be Given to Bills of "Importance"

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—In blunt terms Senator Borah of Idaho, republican independent leader, has served notice he will not be stampeded in the disposal of legislation at the coming term of congress.

Returning to the capital yesterday the Idaho senator used the term "superficial impudence" in discussing implications he saw in the administration quest for assurances from leaders of both republicans and democrats in congress against a filibuster to force an extra session in the spring.

"I have not heard, or any such threats from the democrats, nothing I heard any such threats from the progressives," he said. "I think it an exhibition of superficial impudence to be stalling in effect the progressives of the democrats have not just as keen a sense of responsibility and quite as intelligent conception of their duty as the republicans."

He added he never had filibustered and did not intend doing so now but he proposed "to be stampeded out of giving proper and necessary consideration to appropriation bills and such other important legislation as we know is now pending."

Agenda is Shaping His statement immediately was interpreted here as a sign the independents will demand full consideration for their favored measures. Among them is the Norris resolution for government operation of Muscle Shoals, which now looms a stumbling block to speedy disposition of vital appropriations. Also there has been talk of reviving the export devaluation and equalization fee plans of farm relief, which have been fought by the administration.

Yet, although the republican independents appear aroused by President Hoover's move for democratic cooperation in averting the extra session, leaders of all groups are agreed on the present outlook no deliberate attempt to force a special term is likely.

and suffered internal injuries. Both are in a serious condition in the hospital at Eugene. One of the Kansas children suffered a fractured skull.

The police, Miss Pickford and her noted husband, Douglas Fairbanks, refused to reveal the nature of the kidnapping threats. They would not say if they were received by letter or telephone, or if learned through underworld channels of information.

The girl, daughter of Lottie Pickford, has been the ward of Mrs. Fairbanks for some years. Recently her name, Mary, was changed to Gyvena upon her mother's request to the court.

The police said they had received reports of no other kidnapping threats against the children of the Beverly Hills motion picture people. They denied reports of such threats against the small daughter of Harold Lloyd, film comedian, explaining current rumors had been circulated as the result of his obtaining a new watchman for his estate recently.

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PORTLAND GIVING PRUNES BIG BOOST IN FINE PROGRAM

Markets, Railroads And Hotels Feature Fruit in Special Week of Promotion

Commerce Chamber Puts up Prizes For Recipes; Displays Made in Dept. Stores

The Prune Week plan adopted by the Portland chamber of commerce, following a suggestion made by W. C. Harding, secretary of the Roseburg chamber, is being given much emphasis in Portland, according to articles appearing in Portland papers, which today are carrying numerous prune advertisements. The plans for the observance of the week are reported in the Sunday edition of the Portland Oregonian as follows:

Backed by the trade and commerce departments of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, prune growers will start shipping the 1930 crop to markets, hotels, railroads and restaurants where the fruit will occupy the place of honor on the menu as befits the object which plays the star role in Prune week. Portland hotels, as well as hostesses of Oregon and Washington, will feature the fruit. Four trans-continental railroads will vie with one another in preparing the prune, while leading restaurants in cities of both states will "play the prune" for all it is worth.

Chamber Plans Campaign The campaign which will be carried out during the week in both Oregon and Washington is the result of the plans and work of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, said E. N. Weinbaum, manager of the trade and commerce department and principal director of the plans.

"We are offering a dollar apiece for the first fifty selected recipes submitted by housewives from both states. The recipes, incidentally, will be selected by the chefs of four of Portland's leading hotels and upon their judgment will be based the decisions of the awards. Restaurants have promised to feature the fruit and four trans-continental railroads will serve the prune under a variety of clever disguises. The Northern Pacific railroad has printed a quantity of postcards which feature the product."

Department stores and groceries all over both states will display the fruit in prominent shop windows. Mr. Weinbaum said, and every effort will be made to show the product to the public.
