BOBBY JONES

Retirement of King Robert of Golfdom Causes Sorrow, Revives Tender Memories

ATLANTA, Nov. 18.—And so it "goodbye to all that," for Bobby Jones, and, incidentally, for this co-responder, Bobby's retirement from competitive golf is the end of the trail—the end of a trail that has carried us together a matter of 120,000 miles; three times to Europe, and across the fields of twenty-seven major championships. It was the thing to do, eminently. As Bobby said, whatever he might do, continuing in competition, must be in the nature of a self-climax. He had finished out the "seven fat years" of his career with thirteen major championships. In the closing year, 1930, he had accomplished the impossible—the grand slam of golf—by winning all four major titles; he had hung an incomparably brilliant escape into the impregnable quadrilateral of golf, where his record stands safely entrenched forever. For no one will do it again. In the casual words of an old vaudeville star, "that's all there is—there isn't any more."

Lean Years Recalled
But in the long memories that remain as the glimmer fades, there always will be recollections of the seven lean years, the long pull against fate and fortune and the best golfers in the world, when the greatest golfer of them all played in eleven major championships, and never broke through for a single victory.

In some ways, those are the dearest of "green memories." Those were the days before we traveled in drawing rooms and private cars; when we were lucky to get lower and didn't mind if we had uppers; when, in 1921, on the road to the amateur championship at St. Louis, two years before Bobby broke through, I sat one night in his lower berth while mine was being made down, and he said to me:

"I wonder if I'll ever win a championship."

And I said to Bobby:
"Son, you're the greatest golfer in the world, and when you get that conviction into your skull, you'll win, not one, but a lot of them."

And Bobby only laughed.
Dreams Realized

But Bobby eventually developed an ambition, which we now can talk about freely and with no special show of modesty. After he had won the national open at Inwood in 1923, and followed with the national amateur in 1924 and 1925, he said to me one night:

"There is one thing I'd like to do, in golf. I'd like to be national champion of the United States six years in succession, either amateur or open. Then I'd be ready to hang up the old clubs, and let them all take a shot at that. But of course it can't be done."

And we both laughed, that time.

Of course it couldn't be done. And now—well, now he has been national champion of the United States eight years in succession. Added to which, he has been open champion of Great Britain, 1926, 1927 and 1928.

Thirteen major championships, in the hardest and grimmest and most uncertain of all major sports, achieved in a span of eight years, at the age of 28!

It is time to stop. It is a good end to the long trail.

No Records Left

There are no more records to shoot for. Bobby is the first golfer to win five United States amateur championships. He has equaled the British and the United States record of winning both the amateur and the open in the same year. He is the only competitor who ever won both the British and the United States open championships in the same season, and he has done that twice. And no other golfer, amateur or professional, had won thirteen major titles in a career of any duration—and Bobby's career, which has been just half his life, is of fourteen years.

I have been with Bobby in his hours of blackest depression, as after Willie Hunter beat him in the third round of the national amateur at St. Louis, and when Sweetser beat him the following year, at Brookline. I was with him when he failed by a single stroke to catch Sarazen in the national open of 1922 at Skokie, and when he lost by a single stroke to Farrell at Olympia. In the greatest play-off on record, where each finished with two holes in birdies.

Great Acclaim Won
And I have been with him when the Macom came out to meet the Aquitania, in New York harbor, and later the Europa, when New York was putting on the sort of
