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LEVINE ANSWERS

CHARGE OF EFFORT TO MAKE BAD COIN

VIENNA, Nov. 18.—Charles A. Levine, being held here on suspicion of forgery, vigorously defended himself before the Vienna police court today.

The police president had said Levine had given orders to a Vienna engraver for metal dies and matrices to enable him to coin certain French franc pieces as issued by the French chamber of commerce.

Levine protested that he was badly misunderstood by the engravers, that what he really wanted were dies from which he could cast medals for distinguished airmen.

The engraver maintained that he understood Levine very well, and that his meaning was unmistakable. Levine also asserted he only wanted the dies for his and his wife's portraits.

Meanwhile, the Austrian police have wired the French police to send a commission to Vienna to study the evidence and to investigate further.

ROBBER TOSSES VICTIM IN RIVER

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—Throwing of a robbery victim into the Willamette river after beating him, climaxed a series of holdups and thefts in Portland during last night in which four holdups were executed by a band of hoodlums, dressed in a derby hat and spats, in rapid succession.

Henry Nyberg, 40, was pulled from the river by a seaman of the Admiral Evans, in port here, after he was thrown off the Broadway bridge by robbers who had taken \$65 from him, he told police.

MILLION SPENT ON NATIONAL GUARD IN OREGON IN 2 YEARS

General George A. White's Biennial Report Cites Progress Made and Praise Won.

Efficiency Attained Held Due to Self-Sacrifice and Devotion of Men and Officers.

The federal government has expended approximately one million dollars in Oregon during the past two years as its part in the maintenance of the Oregon national guard, according to the biennial report of the state military department filed by General A. White, commanding general of the national adjutant general of the state.

"Every cent of this money has been expended in the state of Oregon and put in circulation in the counties where units of the guard are stationed," the report, copies of which have been secured by local officers, declares. "The expenditures include armory drill, the camp pay for the officers and men, pay of officers and enlisted men of the regular army on duty with the guard, foodstuffs and supplies for field camps, labor and materials for construction purposes and other items."

"The cost of the guard to the state is comparatively small, the state receiving virtually \$5 for every dollar expended," the report continues.

Would Buy Camp Site
"More than \$130,000 has been expended by the war department in permanent installations at the field training site at Camp Clatsop, with promises from the government for the allotment of an additional \$103,000 during the next few years to complete the project. The only cost to the state is the annual rental fee of \$255. The state holds an option to buy the camp site at a very low figure, a step that General White recommends in view of the fact that the annual rental fee, if considered in terms of interest, represents an interest rate of more than 6 per cent."

Progress Wins Praise
"The results of both army and field training are outstanding in every respect, notwithstanding the very requirements of the war department are becoming more rigid each year. The progress in all phases of troop training has been such as to warrant unstinted praise from inspectors assigned by the government to observe and report the activities of the Oregon national guard."

Marksmen Rank High
"Nationally attention has been attracted toward Oregon as the result of the outstanding record made by the Oregon national guard in the national matches at Camp Perry, O. That more favorable and beneficial advertising has accrued to the state through the spectacular victories of the Oregon team during the national small arms epic than through any other source, is the belief of many officials who have visited camp."

"Not only did the Oregon team outshoot all national guard and civilian teams in the country during the main feature of the matches, but it won the national guard trophy in the infantry competition. One member of the team became the long distance champion shot in the country when he won the famous Wimbledon match."

"The present strength of the Oregon national guard is 217 officers, three warrant officers and 285 men. In addition, the national guard reserve, a component of the
