## TURKEY GROWERS OF OAKLAND HOLD FOR XMAS TRADE

(News-Review Douglas County Special)  
OAKLAND, Nov. 18.—Oakland has presented a busy appearance this week on account of the marketing of dressed turkeys. Monday the cooperative association received birds and a large number of cars were lined up to deliver them. Owing to the numerous grades, delivery was slowed up to a certain extent. Objection was voiced by some of the growers over strict regulations. Cash payment was made on the basis of sixty per cent of expected price or 18 cents for fancy young toms. Other grades in proportion. Howard Green, of Canyonville, had charge of the grading.

Monday another long line of cars was in evidence as Schenck and Gator received about 1500 turkeys, price paid being 25 cents for summer 1 young toms and hens and 21 cents for old toms and 14 cents for number 2 grade. They also received birds at Yoncalla on Monday and Tuesday. J. T. Bridges Co. will receive at Oakland Friday. It appears the growers are killing but a small per cent of this year's hatch, expecting to market most of the birds later when they will be in better condition.
