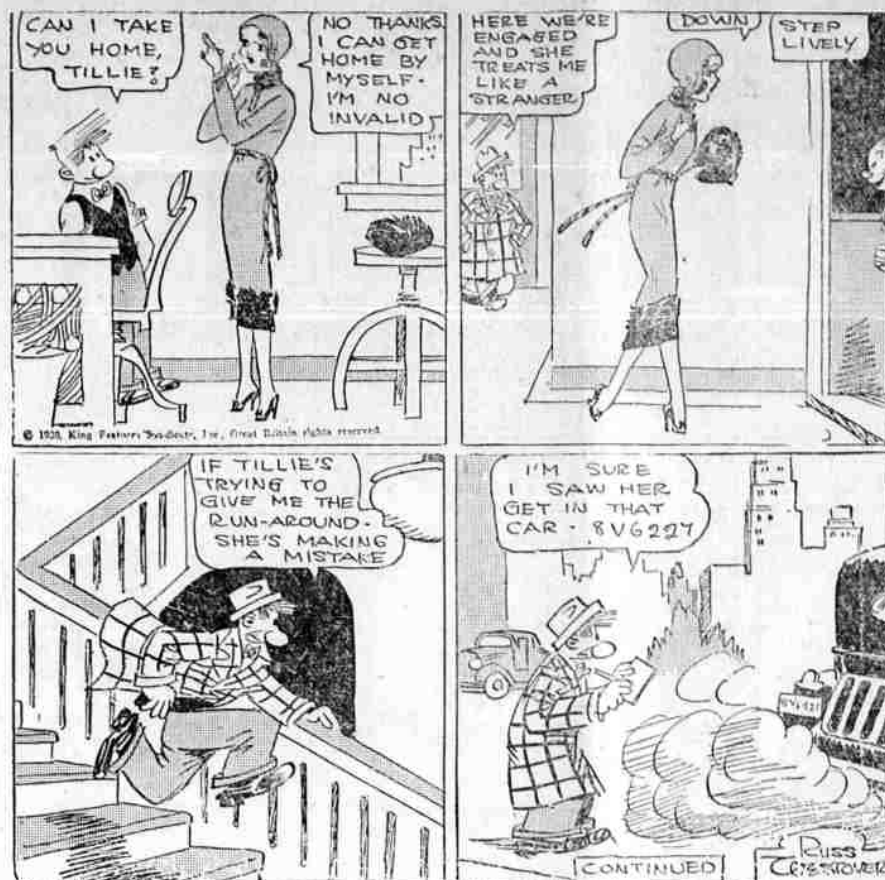

M'CORMACK SINGS ELEVEN SONGS IN CURRENT PICTURE

In "Song O' My Heart," his first audible picture for the screen, John McCormack, the world's greatest lyric tenor, sings eleven numbers, logically introduced in the action of the delightful lyrical romance which comes to the Indian theatre today and Thursday.

Through the medium of the talkie the voice that has always been proclaimed great is considered to be made greater via the singing screen.

Of the entire repertoire, "I Hear You Calling Me," "Rose of Tralee," and "Little Boy Blue," are perhaps the most appreciated numbers.

"Little Boy Blue" is based on the poem by Eugene Field and set to music by Ethelbert Nevin. In singing "Little Boy Blue," Frank Borzage, who directed "Song O' My Heart," has deftly introduced a pictorial effect of a little boy, his dog and his toy soldiers, giving an added human touch.

"I Hear You Calling Me," which is so identified with the great tenor that he rarely fails to include it as an encore during his concert programs, is a composition of Charles Marshall, with lyrics by Harold Harwood. "Rose of Tralee" is a classic Irish number.

"Song O' My Heart" is the story of a broken romance, which marks the life of McCormack, a young and ambitious singer in Ireland. The girl, Alice Joyce, marries an other, becomes the mother of a boy and girl and is deserted by the husband.

In addition to Alice Joyce, the supporting company includes such favorites as Maureen O'Sullivan, J. M. Kerrigan, John Garrik, Farrel Macdonald, Effie Ellsler, and Tommy Clifford.

MRS. PARIS AGAIN GRILLED IN DEATH OF MRS. BOWLES

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 19 — Mrs. Irma Loucks Paris, 25, in whose apartment Mrs. Leone Bowles, 33, society matron, died from a knife wound a week ago, was recalled to police headquarters today for her third questioning in the attack. She, with Nelson S. Bowles, millionaire husband of the dead woman, was in the apartment when Mrs. Bowles died. They declare she killed herself after inquiring into the relationship existing between the two.

Detectives and the district attorney's office today centered their investigation on the time element in the case. They said discrepancies as to time are increasing as the bulky transcript of testimony grows.

The inquest into Mrs. Bowles' death will be held tomorrow. A toxicologist at the University of Oregon medical school reported today there were no traces of poison in stomach tissue from the dead woman's body. Police had ordered an examination.
