Celebrate Golden Wedding Anniversary



Of considerable interest to friends of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Lozier, is their announcement of their golden wedding anniversary date on November 18. Their many friends remembered them by sending beautiful and useful gifts in honor of the occasion. The Oregon Granite Works presented a gold fountain pen to Mr. Lozier and a gold vase to Mrs. Lozier.

Mr. and Mrs. Lozier and three children (two of whom live in Roseburg) came from Elma Green, Indiana, to Medford, Oregon in 1893, where Mr. Lozier purchased a tract of land, which he set out in prune trees. Mr. Lozier worked at the carpenter trade until the trees were bearing sufficient fruit. During this time he, with nine others, built the first telephone line out of Medford. He built and operated the third prune drier in the Rogue River valley. After the prune orchard came into bearing, Mrs. Lozier, with the children, picked the fruit, dried about 1500 pounds, using a temporary box like structure for the drier, and sold the product for four cents a pound.

The next year, a small prune drier was built and help hired, while Mrs. Lozier managed it. Mrs. Lozier is a woman of unusual pluck and courage and a great helpmate to her husband. The following year Mr. Lozier engaged drying in earnest, building a large prune drier and doing custom drying of apples in connection with the prunes. He followed this business for several years, shipping in carload lots to Chicago, but not finding the business remunerative he moved his family to Lake county, where they remained for three years, later going to Klamath Falls, where he became salesman for the Klamath Falls Marble Works. The family remained in Klamath Falls until the opening of the World war, when they returned to Medford and later went to Astoria, where Mr. Lozier was employed in the shipyard.

Again returning to Medford in the spring of 1919, he accepted a position with the Oregon Granite Works as branch manager at Klamath Falls, which is the position he still holds. Both Mr. and Mrs. Lozier are faithful members of the Roseburg Baptist church. Mrs. Lozier is conversant at her home, after being hostess for the past month. Her many bouquets in her room, which were presented to her by friends, is proof of her magnetic quality in making many friends.
