

STRING QUARTETTE OFFERS ROSEBURG CLASSIC PROGRAM

Admittance to Be Limited to Members of Chamber Music Organization and Guests.

Members of the South-East-North-West quartette, who are to appear in a concert tonight at the Presbyterian church, under the sponsorship of the Roseburg Chamber Music society, arrived in town this morning, and spent the day visiting with music instructors of the city. This musical event will doubtless be one of the most outstanding programs of the year, as it is seldom that such an organization as this string quartette is enabled to play in any city other than a metropolis. All of the artists are paid large sums and their expenses in traveling are heavy. This quartette, however, is endorsed by a wealthy Los Angeles woman, who is a sponsor of chamber music, and is thereby able to give to the smaller cities the privilege of hearing this world-wide music.

The program this evening will be presented at 8:15 o'clock. Admittance is for members and guests only. Membership to the society is still open, and cards may be obtained as late as this evening from Mrs. C. S. Heimann, Mrs. Naomi Scott, or other music teachers. The membership fee is \$2.00, which entitles the member to three admissions, making a very small cost for each ticket.

Rupis Entertained
Music pupils of Mrs. Heimann and Miss Scott were entertained Sunday evening at a concert at a dinner at the home of Mrs. Heimann in Laurewood. Miss Scott at that time presented a paper dealing with the origin of chamber music, which dates back to 1500. The contributions of various composers to chamber music was discussed, and the growing importance of this class of music was shown. Of recent years music lovers have been giving more and more attention to chamber organizations, and particularly the string quartette. Miss Scott stated, also, the history of some of the more famous chamber music organizations, and showed the necessity for exceptional ability and technique on the part of those who contribute to such concerts.

Particular attention was given to the program to be presented tonight, each selection being analyzed and the various movements interpreted, so that the pupils will be able to more thoroughly understand the music as presented by these artists.

WIFE'S RIGHT TO OWN TAX RETURN UPHELD BY COURT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The supreme court ruled today that income community property in Arizona, Louisiana, Texas and Washington may be reported for federal taxation in separate returns by the husband and wife.

The decision, handed down by Justice Roberts, upheld the findings of courts in the four states. In a recent similar case from California, the supreme court ruled the wife's interest was not vested, but expectant, and that the husband alone must make the income tax return.

Today's decision may affect income tax returns from Idaho, Nevada, and New Mexico. Where the wife under state law has a right to one-half of the community income she is entitled, the court asserted, to make out a separate return covering her share of the community income.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE MONEY USED TO SUCCOR NEEDY

Disbursements During 1930 Leave Empty Treasury; Support Asked for Work in 1931.

To the tune of "That's Where My Money Goes," the Douglas county health association yesterday issued its report on disbursements of the Christmas seal funds received by it last year and used to further its health conservation program during 1930.

J. H. Booth, treasurer of the association, reported that of the \$241.65 retained by the association last year, \$99.50 has been devoted to correcting health defects of children who otherwise might have been seriously and unnecessarily handicapped for many years, if not for life. Another \$30.00 went for the provision of clothing and comforts for tuberculosis patients.

The sum of \$199.75 was used for the establishment of a permanent dental clinic in the court house in Roseburg for the purpose of providing dental treatment for those children in Douglas county whose parents are unable to pay their family dentist for such services. This is not indigent work, as a charge of from five to fifty cents, according to their ability to pay, is made for all work received. The equipment for this clinic was purchased with funds received from membership drive in May, funds from the Christmas seal sale of 1929, and a part of it was donated by a local dentist. The dentists of Roseburg are donating their services for the clinic and have shown splendid cooperation, according to Mrs. John Runyan, president.

Money Properly Used
"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure any time and any place," declared Mrs. Runyan, "and it has been the policy of this association to use what little money it had to help prevent physical defects, sickness and the spread of communicable diseases. We have cooperated with Ellen A. Post and Miss Clara Eggertson, county nurses, and with Dr. R. R. Shoemaker, county health officer, and have had their friendly advice and guidance all along."

With nothing left in the treasury the health association is depending upon the generous support of Douglas county people to help replenish its funds for 1931 by buying Christmas seals. This sale will not open until the day after Thanksgiving and will run until Christmas. Proceeds from the sale of these tiny health seals will continue the association's main source of income for its work.

This county is one of the 22 in the state affiliated with the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, which supplies the seals to the local group. The sale throughout the state by these organizations is expected to equal, if not exceed, last year's sale of \$36,500. The state average sale per person was 67 seals. Purchases in this county averaged 46 seals per person.

CRAZED BOY KILLS PARENTS AND SELF

fore, he said when quizzed in the chamber offices. "I'll say nothing."

He claimed an alibi to account for all of his movements during the last three years. But on this point, too, he was silent when it came to details.

Frank Causes Suspicion
His arrest came less than 36 hours after the huge bomb, which exploded and was capable of wrecking both the Chronicle and the Spokane-Review buildings, had been discovered by Cleveland Williams, Spokane correspondent of the Associated Press. The bomb, contained in a trunk, was delivered to the Associated Press office, centrally located in the Chronicle building.

Williams became suspicious when he was unable to place the sender and the trunk began to leak. A locksmith opened the trunk, revealing the gigantic bomb, which Williams immediately disconnected. It was timed to explode at 1 p. m., yesterday, shortly after noon of the employees for the Monday edition of the Spokane-Review came to work.

Tell-Tale Number
The trail of the bomb was traced back through Seattle and Portland to San Francisco. Here it had been picked up by a transfer man on the sidewalk not far from where the bomb was exploded. The trail led to him through the number on the battery in the bomb. Police found records indicating he had the battery charged here a little over a year ago.

Tries to Shift Blame
He conveyed the impression under persistent questioning that the battery belonged to an old radio set of which he had disposed.

His chief interest was in the "gauge" he blamed for both bombing attempts.

"There are two political gangs fighting each other in Spokane," he said. "One is just as dirty as the other. They were fighting three years ago and they are still fighting, apparently."

He was hooked "en route to Spokane" and held without bail. He said he would fight extradition.

to Spokane if an attempt were made to remove him.

EXPLOSION PREVENTED BY BREAKING OF ATTACHMENT
SPokane, Wash., Nov. 24.—Armed guards patrolled the vicinity of the Chronicle and Spokane-Review buildings here today as authorities of the Pacific coast wove a net of evidence around two men suspected of sending a diabolically clever bomb to the Associated Press office in the heart of the structure.

Sufficiently powerful to have wrecked the building and brought injuries and death to hundreds of persons, the bomb failed to detonate, officers said only because one of the wires fastened to a terminal of a battery intended to furnish the fatal spark, was broken when the lid of the steamer trunk was snapped shut by the friend who designed it.

Catastrophe Averted
The trunk was delivered to the Associated Press office Saturday morning. It was not opened until 1 p. m.—half an hour after timing mechanism in the infernal machine had been set to go off. Explosive experts marvelled that rough handling when the trunk was trundled on a newspaper truck and taken to a locksmith had not resulted in a tragedy. A moment's contact of the broken wires might have detonated the dynamite caps planted in the center of 300 sticks of sixty per cent dynamite releasing enough force to destroy the average city block.

A postcard in the bomb warning of "another box tomorrow" caused a heavy guard to be placed around the threatened building.
