

CONCERT OF STRING QUARTETTE PROVES MUSICAL TREAT

Roseburg music lovers enjoyed a wonderful treat last night in the concert presented by the Noah-Kah-Nie string quartette, which appeared at the Presbyterian church under the auspices of the Roseburg Chamber Music society. Each member of the quartette is a master, and individual technique brought much admiration from the listeners. The ensemble was perfect, and the quartette played with a brilliancy that was most inspiring. The program included Haydn's Op. 78 No. 1, "Londonderry Air," by Bridge; Grieg's Irish air, "Molly on the Shore," and Smetana's "From My Life," a four-part suite of intensely emotional character.

Following the program the members of the society decided to perfect a permanent organization to sponsor worth-while music in the city. Harris Ellsworth was elected temporary chairman, and a meeting of the members will be called in the near future to make plans for the season.

NON-SUIT ORDERED IN \$1707 ACTION OVER TRUCK DEAL

The jury for the November term of circuit court was dismissed today when the case of McCoy against Willis was non-suited. The plaintiff, owner of the McCoy Motor company of Vancouver, Washington, was attempting to collect \$1,707 from W. W. Willis of Canyonville, the money being claimed as payment for parts and accessories furnished for a truck. It was shown that Willis entered into the deal as a surety for his brother-in-law in the purchase of the truck, but had no part in the purchase of any accessories or parts. The company had previously foreclosed its mortgage on the truck and had secured execution of the judgment. Following the completion of the plaintiff's case, the defense moved for a non-suit, which was granted by Judge Hamilton, claiming that there was not sufficient evidence to support the complaint.

It was reported to the court that other cases set for the term had been settled out of court, and the jury was excused from further attendance.
