HUSKIES EXPECT TO GIVE TROJANS CLOSE ENCOUNTER

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25.—Thirty-five rejuvenated Washington university Huskies bore down on the city of Troy today hoping to catch the University of Southern California Trojans unaware on Thanksgiving day. Their spirits considerably bolstered by their close game with Washington State last week, the invaders found many supporters here who thought the Southern California eleven would be looking ahead for its game with Notre Dame, December 6, and might be caught off stride. Although workouts were secret, the gossip at Harvard field had it that the Trojans were planning to spring an aerial attack on the Washington team and at the same time were building a defense against the Notre Dame style of play. Coach Jimmy Phelan has introduced at the northwestern school. Jones has warned his men especially against Merle Huffer and Bill Marsh, the Huskies' crack backfield men, and Captain Al Holmes and Paul Schweigler, backbones of a line that has proved itself consistently this year. "Goh" Wentworth, center, is another Washingtonian who is expected to be troublesome. Ralph Wilcox, regular Trojan end, probably will not play Thanksgiving. Howard Joeline is favored to get his place.

OUTLOOK GOOD FOR VETS' HOME HERE, HARDING STATES

A Thanksgiving theme pervaded the program of the Kiwanis club at the regular noon luncheon meeting today. W. C. Harding, secretary of the chamber of commerce, spoke on a Thanksgiving topic, and concluded with an optimistic discussion of the soldiers' home project. He stated that while this matter is not yet settled, every indication is that Roseburg is the favored location, and that the efforts put forth by the city will be the deciding factor in the final determination when taken together with Roseburg's superior climatic conditions and geographical location. He stated that he is not in any way disappointed or discouraged, but, on the other hand, feels very optimistic over the outlook. He also presented plans of the chamber of commerce for relieving the labor situation, and is requesting each member of the several service clubs to find or provide at least one day's work for one man during the month. The service club members are also being asked to provide clothing which can be used by needy families during the winter months. The chamber of commerce, Mr. Harding reported, is working with Miss Agnes Pitchford, county juvenile officer, and the community chest in these relief activities.

"NIBS" PRICE OUT AS GRID MENTOR; EDITOR GOES BACK

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 25.—The University of California is looking for a new football coach today. Coach C. M. "Nibs" Price resigned last night at the close of an unsuccessful season. His resignation as head football and basketball coach was accepted by the student executive committee, whose action is final. The committee, however, urged the athletic council, whom it directed to recommend new coaches, to retain Price as basketball mentor. He had been basketball coach for five years and head football coach for four. The executive committee also reinstated Arthur Arlett as editor of the Daily Californian, student publication. The heliograph editor was removed last Wednesday night by the committee for his editorializing an investigation of California's football situation and implying players were subsidized at the University of Southern California, one of the four teams to vanquish the Bears this season. The executive committee voted to pay Price the full amount due under his contract, which ran for another year, in recognition of his service. His salary was reported to be \$12,000 a year.

trof of the republicans. Cooperation Qualified. "Of one thing I am certain, it is no part of my duty to filibuster against appropriation bills and I have no intention of doing so. Readiness to cooperate in the passage of appropriation bills and emergency measures in no sense implies support on my part of the policies of the republican party or approval of its record. To determine now that an extra session is unavoidable inevitably will result in postponement of action on measures and subjects which ought to be disposed of during the regular session." Robinson did not specify what legislation he felt should be disposed of during the regular session outside of emergency and appropriation bills. He pointed out, however, he had tried to effect a compromise on Muscle shoals legislation last session and expressed the view some disposition should be made of this question if possible. He also said he would be "glad" to see the export debenture enacted, adding it would take little time for discussion because of the thorough debates on it in the past.

HOOVER FAVORS CHANGE IN IMMIGRATION LAWS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—More selective and flexible immigration laws were held by President Hoover today to be needed. The chief executive's immigration views were expressed as in general agreement with those recently announced by Senator Reed of Pennsylvania.

Reed proposed stopping of all immigration from both quota and non-quota countries. The president did not say he specifically favored this plan, but pointed to recent action by the government in cutting down immigration by a strict appliance of the rules, including one excluding all persons who might become public charges. Mr. Hoover said the effect of the stricter regulations was demonstrated in October. He said that from an average of 21,000 immigrants monthly from all sources that the total for October was less than 6,000.

VAN DYKE RELEASED ON GOOD BEHAVIOR

J. D. Van Dyke of Drew, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, was arraigned in the circuit court today and entered a plea of not guilty. In view of the circumstances of the case Judge Hamilton released Van Dyke on his own recognizance, and is continuing the case during good behavior.

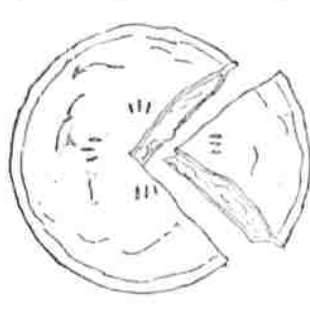
