Mrs. John Runyan, chairman for the sale of Christmas seals in Roseburg, today announced that any checks in payment for Christmas seals should be made payable to J. H. Booth, treasurer of the Douglas county public health association, which sponsors the sale of these penny seals and carries on the fight against tuberculosis in this county.

"Strict adherence to this request that checks be made to Mr. Booth will mean a saving of time and effort and tend to prevent any mistakes in handling the funds," stated Mrs. Runyan.

"If the interest already evinced in the sale of Christmas seals is at all prophetic of the results of the sale, I am convinced that we will have the greatest sale we have ever had. Gardiner this year has asked for its own chairman in order that the work there may be more centralized and greater cooperation received. Heretofore, the chairman in Roseburg has had charge of this district."
