

CAMPAIGN WILL STIMULATE HOME BUILDING HERE

An extensive campaign to increase interest in home construction and remodeling during the winter months is to be undertaken by local dealers in building materials and supplies. A meeting is to be held by these dealers tomorrow night at the chamber of commerce office, where plans will be discussed.

One of the interesting features of the campaign will be the distribution of a unique outfit for use in planning home construction or remodeling. One of these outfits is now on display at the chamber of commerce office, having been arranged by the Coen Lumber company.

These outfits are very interesting and make nice practical ways to plan a home.

Outfit materials are provided to build the walls, partitions, locate electric conduits, lighting fixtures, plumbing, doors, windows, etc. Each piece is cut according to scale and there are also cards representing furniture. This material, together with a large blackboard, pins, etc., is furnished and the prospective home owner can lay out a house, place the furniture and work out the entire plan on scale and thereby obtain an excellent impression of the results that will be obtained. It is a most practical system for the home builder, and one that will doubtless prove very popular.

Due to the low cost of labor and materials at this time, home owners or prospective builders are able to do work at a much lower cost than at any time in previous years, and in addition to being a great relief, the local unemployment situation will be greatly relieved if cooperation can be secured in the campaign to be inaugurated by the dealers.

acilitating constantly for the laboring men in strikes and troubles of all sorts.

From place to place she went, in and out of jail, deported from states, but never quitting. In her there was no compromise.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said of her death: "The loss sustained cannot be measured and the service she rendered will never be surpassed or excelled. The heads of men and women of labor are very sad."

Battled 60 Years.

Mary or "Mother" Jones, as she was known to union labor men and women all over the country, was more than 60 years one of the most forceful and militant personalities with which capital and labor had to deal.

Wherever strikes and labor troubles were fiercest, there was "Mother" Jones in her little black bonnet and with her biting, eloquent tongue. She had the power to make men follow her, even sometimes against the labor world.

She started out in the 70's championing the cause of the laborer, to secure for him better working and living conditions. Nothing stopped her or turned her back, whether it was militia or governors. Her activities were most spectacular in the mines of Colorado, the coal fields of West Virginia and the cotton mills of the South.

Representative Andrew, republican, Massachusetts, called for a national referendum on repeal of the eighteenth amendment. Others ran the usual gamut of congressional proposals.

The president's message will be ready Tuesday and the legislative bill will begin grinding in earnest on Wednesday when the budget message is read.

Reds Stage Riot

A crowd of several hundred persons, some calling themselves communists, gathered in front of the capitol today carrying placards which were quickly torn down by the police.

Police did not interfere until the placards were displayed. Some of these called for "release of all political prisoners" and "down with finger printing and registration."

Members of the regular capitol police squad then tore into the crowd, snatching the placards and pushing some of the demonstrators.

There was sporadic fighting, but this was quickly stopped. One of the two score policemen released a tear gas bomb which, however, appeared to cause more tears among the spectators than the demonstrators.

Under the guidance of police, the demonstrators headed toward the house side of the capitol plaza and finally struggled out in a hour, time around the south end of the building.

Some fist fighting continued with a few women being pointed to the melee.

changes in the assessor's office, where \$1,650 is asked for the first deputy, \$1,500 for the second and \$1,200 for the third. It was explained that first deputies in other offices receive \$1,650 and that the change would make a uniform scale throughout. The league, however, contended that such adjustments should be made within the office and no increase should be allowed in the total budget.

Various items in the assessor's budget, totalling an increase of \$735, brought objections, and it was recommended that the budget be left the same as last year. The league also recommended that the budget for the county school superintendent be the same as in 1929, \$4,345.68, as compared with \$4,796 as requested.

Promotion Fund O. K'd
A recommendation was also made that the county court appropriate

\$500 to be used by the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce for state advertising.

There was considerable discussion regarding school affairs, principally the teachers' institute, which it was contended should be held prior to the opening of schools in order to save interruption during the school year.

A resolution of appreciation to Commissioner Huron Clough, who retires from the court the first of the year, was unanimously adopted.

The league went on record as approving the elimination of penalties and interest on taxes delinquent prior to 1927, but recommended that this be the last time that the court make such a provision.

Attendance Small
The meeting Saturday was attended by only a small group of taxpayers, due in part to the fact that Pomona grange met on the same day. It was decided that the next year arrangements for the two meetings should be made so that there will be no conflict.

Members of the league were submitted to the court for its consideration prior to the final adoption of the budget. The budget cannot be finally adopted until the report regarding the state tax is received, which will be some time during the latter part of the month.

nia robberies attributed to Smith are: The Rodeo branch of the Bank of Pinole, September 26, 1929, in which Constable Arthur McDonald was killed and \$28,000 stolen; the Tracy post office robbery in 1928 when \$25,000 was taken; the McAvoy train robbery in which \$16,000 was taken, June 22, 1929; and the hijacking of the Calwa winery, near Fresno, March 1928, when \$170,000 worth of liquor was stolen.

He was also wanted in Everett, Wash., for robbery and in Vancouver, B. C., for a train holdup.

The 38-year-old bandit's criminal record began when he was 17. He participated in a daring bank robbery at Santa Clara, Calif., and tried to shoot his way out. He then went to a Seattle family. He was sent to San Quentin prison. Subsequently he served terms in the Washington state reformatory for a Seattle burglary and the Washington state penitentiary.

Getaway Try Fails

His career ended shortly after his arrest. As the police automobile drew up in front of the post office where he was to be questioned he attempted to wrest a pistol from an officer and leaped from the machine. As he fled Police Inspector Walter Garrett shot

him through the back. The bullet penetrated Smith's heart. He had not been handcuffed because he pleaded he was ill.

The arrest was made by United States postal inspectors, police and sheriff's officers.

The bandit's arsenal included repeating rifles, pistols, a shot gun, two bullet proof vests, a bullet proof kidney pad and a store of ammunition.

Trained Like Fleagle

The Nobel robbery was traced to Smith by postal inspectors and the state bureau of criminal investigation through his methods of operation—the same method used in running down Jake Fleagle, killed in Missouri October 14 when he resisted arrest. Postal inspectors had trailed Smith since the Tracy post office robbery.

Following the shooting, a parade of witnesses was brought to view the robber's body. Smith was identified by Louis Kronick, Pinole merchant, as the wounded bandit who raised from the floor in the Pinole bank robbery and killed Constable McDonald.

W. T. O'Malley, San Jose, said he had sold the bandit's automobile to Smith a few days before the robbery.

Vincent Lombardo, E. Corrita identified Smith as the leader of the Nobel robbery.

Lost Found in Home

Much currency, part of which was believed to be from the Nobel loot, was found in his home. A notebook, containing train schedules and notes of "the best days to move in," carried jottings which officers interpreted as being direc-

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tions for the Nobel robbery. Postal inspectors said Mrs. Smith had been identified as the "mystery woman" who drove getaway cars in the Pinole and McAvoy robberies. Officers said they planned to round up the entire gang, but the bandits had received wind of their plans. Officials acted immediately, but Smith's confederates had already disappeared. Search was ordered for automobiles bearing Washington license number 375-995 and California license number 7-K-31-65.

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
