The body of Millard F. Callahan, early resident of Douglas county, who died Thursday in Seattle, arrived in Roseburg yesterday, and was buried at the Melrose cemetery this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Callahan, who was born at Rogers, Ark., December 15, 1857, came across the plains with his parents, George J. and Sophia Holmes Callahan, in 1863 and the family settled in French Settlement, near Melrose, where he spent more than 20 years of his life engaged in farming and in the sawmill business.

He moved to Seattle 20 years ago and was engaged in sawing, work until his recent illness.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Dora Callahan of Seattle and a son, George. He was one of eleven children, and of the family only three sisters are left: Mrs. Edith Gabbert and Miss Ella Callahan, Portland, and Mrs. Frank C. Dunn, Melrose.

The services at Melrose were conducted by Rev. Alexander Muirhead with arrangements in charge of M. E. Ritter.
