ITEMS FOR OREGON INCLUDED IN LIST ON U. S. BUDGET

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Construction of the huge dam on the Colorado river is to be pushed forward in the next fiscal year with use by the reclamation bureau of \$17,000,000 of a total of \$26,677,000 proposed to cover all the bureau's activities.

An increase of \$2,938,126 in appropriations for the bureau was recommended to congress today by President Hoover.

Estimates for continuing construction work on the Owyhee project in Oregon, for which \$2,000,000 was appropriated last year, formed the largest single item after the Colorado dam and totalled \$3,000,000.

Appropriations totalling \$3,187,730, a decrease of \$1,911,568, for the national parks service during the fiscal year of 1932, were also recommended to congress today by President Hoover.

The largest items were \$564,530 for Yellowstone park and \$429,040 for Yosemite. Of the grand total, \$5,000,000 would be spent on roads and trails and \$150,000 for forest and fire protection.

Other recommendations including: Crater lake, Ore., \$76,320.

Funds for educating the red man, which the Indian bureau considers one of its greatest problems, were increased in the budget.

Although the total for the bureau was reduced \$3,611,515 to \$34,595,152, the estimates called for an increase of \$677,416 for education, an additional \$320,340 for industrial assistance, and a larger amount for conservation of health.
