

VICTIM IN TRIANGLE SHOOTING BETTER

PORTLAND, Dec. 3.—Jack H. Lovett, 30, Seattle salesman, today was believed to be recovering from bullet wounds inflicted, police said, by John M. Llewellyn, 38, president of the Portland Bolt and Manufacturing company.

After wounding Lovett, Llewellyn turned his pistol on Mrs. Ida Hume, 26, and then drove to his summer home near here and took his own life with a shotgun.

The shooting occurred in Mrs. Hume's apartment where Lovett said he and Mrs. Hume were at breakfast.

Llewellyn is survived by his widow, Mrs. Hattie Llewellyn, who is treasurer of the manufacturing company, and by two sons and a daughter.

Friends of the dead girl told police Llewellyn had been seeing her often recently, and sent her cards, flowers and letters. Last week, she told her friends, he became angry when he saw her with another man and told her he would kill her if she saw anyone else. A few days later he telephoned her and repeated the threat. Today he went to her apartment and found her with Lovett.

THE DALLES WILL HELP UNEMPLOYED

THE DALLES, Dec. 3.—A payroll of \$12,000 to \$15,000 will be made available in The Dalles this winter to assist in the unemployment situation, Jack Milne, chairman of the water commission for the city, announced. The commission will advance its project of replacing 12,000 feet of old wooden flume with steel pipe. The total cost of the replacement program will be \$30,000.

The commission announced it would only employ The Dalles residents and heads of families when the work starts.

COOS TO EMPLOY DAIRY INSPECTOR

MARSHFIELD, Dec. 3.—For the first time in the history of the county Coos will employ a dairy inspector. Dairymen and dairy manufacturers, after a long campaign, secured \$1800 from the county to employ an inspector. The county court stipulated that if the dairymen failed to increase this sum to \$2400 a year, the new official will be hired for nine months only.

ROCKEFELLERS GIVE TO HELP WORKERS

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—John D. Rockefeller Sr., and his son gave a million dollars today to the emergency unemployment committee of New York City, the committee announced.

Their contribution brought the fund to \$4,136,000. The total sought is \$6,000,000, estimated to be needed to furnish employment to 15,000 men during the winter.

"Think the president will get the money," said Chairman Clegg of the appropriations committee of the house. Leader Tamm turned it "a reasonable request."

The democratic way of receiving it was tepid, but there was comparatively little harsh criticism. Brookhart, Iowa republican independent, thought agricultural legislation should have been recommended along more general lines and the lone farmer-labor member of the house, Kvale of Minnesota, said there was "an awful lot" left to be desired but he liked the tone of the message.

BOAT FISHING ON DESCHUTES FOUGHT

THE DALLES, Dec. 3. Local sportsmen, who say that sportsmen's organizations of eastern and central Oregon are unanimously behind the move, will ask the coming session of the legislature to enact a law that will prohibit boat fishing on the Deschutes river.

Sportsmen cite that boat fishing has ruined the McKenzie river as a trout fishing stream, and that during the past summer hundreds of McKenzie boatmen have invaded the central Oregon country, leaving their boats to wealthy fishermen.

Such a practice continued over a few years, it is declared, will ruin boat fishing for Deschutes' famous trout.

Eastern Oregon sportsmen have introduced a legislative bill which will prohibit a simultaneous open season for chin pheasants both west and east of the Cascade Mountains, they say. Hunters from western Oregon come to eastern Oregon and secure their limit of birds. Then, when the season opens later in counties west of the mountains they hunt there and get another limit. Virtually no eastern Oregon hunters seek pheasants west of the mountains, local men say.

But, aimed at Soviet WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—A complete embargo against importations from soviet Russia is proposed in a bill introduced by Senator Oddie, republican, Nevada.

Smith says that men have pushed wheelbarrows across the country and have rolled golf balls over the transcontinental highways, but he has never heard of anyone attempting to push a motorcycle from Seattle to New York, so he is attempting a new stunt. He accepts no tolls and does not even charge down the hills, but treks along the highway shoving a vehicle with an empty gas tank and the engine disconnected.

FARM BOARD TO ASK \$150,000,000 ADDITIONAL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The president's budget message was authority today for an estimate that the farm board's authorized revolving fund of \$500,000,000 will all have been appropriated to aid the purposes of the act through the fiscal year 1932.

A total of \$250,000,000 has been appropriated. Of that, \$15,000,000 was made available when the agricultural marketing act became law. To that was added an additional \$100,000,000 in April this year.

The budget estimate for the farm board revolving fund for 1932 was placed at \$100,000,000. While no additional appropriation for 1931 has been made, the report anticipated that it will be necessary to submit a supplemental estimate of \$150,000,000 to be made immediately available to meet obligations.

Chairman Legge and other members of the board have indicated that such an emergency appropriation would be asked of this session. At present, although the board has virtually \$60,000,000 in the revolving fund, all but an approximate \$7,000,000 has been committed to loans.

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE REFLECTS ECONOMY TREND

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The administration's efforts at economy were reflected today in the first of the big annual government supply bills. The house received from its appropriations committee the bill for the treasury and post office, carrying \$1,083,553,943 for the fiscal year 1932. The outlay is \$83,400,035 less than expenditures of the current year.

A reduction of \$104,000,000 in the allotment for tax refunds largely is responsible for the saving.

For the first time since the prohibition bureau was created this bill carried no funds for any dry law enforcement. That agency was transferred to the justice department last July.

For Soldiers' Homes To complete the \$15,000,000 veterans' hospitals program, the budget lists \$7,950,000 for liquidating authorized contracts and \$3,400,000 for construction of branches of the national soldiers' home. The branch homes, the budget specifies, are to be located in one of the Northwest Pacific states, in one of the Southern states; and for additional construction at the Mountain Branch, Johnson City, Tenn., and the Eastern Branch, Togus, Me., as authorized by congress. No 1931 appropriation was made for similar purposes.

The estimates for 1932 are predicated upon an average of daily membership of 24,350 as against the 1931 appropriation basis of 20,000, and include:

For administration and operation of the homes, \$12,226,766, which is \$2,214,216 more than the total amount for the same purposes in 1931. It is estimated this will be required to provide for the increase in population, \$558,220 of the increase is for additional personnel. For aid to state or territorial homes, \$600,000, \$40,000 more than the appropriation for 1931.

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CHINESE BATTLING OVER MISSIONERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PEIPING, China, Dec. 3.—Severe fighting has occurred during the last few days between the so-called first Red army and the government troops which are attempting to secure release of the American missionary, Rev. Bert N. Nelson, and the Norwegian missionary, K. N. Tvedt. Both are held by communists at Hwangang, Hupeh province.

The government side admits 200 casualties, but claims losses totaling 1,000 have been inflicted on the Reds. A telegram from the United States consent at Hankow states that some of the emissaries sent to effect release of the missionaries have themselves been captured by the Reds and are being held.

A letter from Nelson, dated November 12, said the bandits were constantly threatening to kill him unless his ransom was paid.

A Chinese relief expedition brought the missionary, Mrs. L. D. Hayward and Miss E. Gomerall, safely to Paochow late this afternoon after rescuing them from bandits who captured them last week as they came down the Yellow river on a raft.

HANKOW, China, Dec. 3.—Father Augustino de Gasperi, Francis an Italian priest, has been captured by communists and is being held for ransom near Shichow, in the extreme northern part of Hunan province.

RAILROADS GIVEN RATE SLASH DELAY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Railroads in the western and eastern rate zones today notified the interstate commerce commission they would be unable to put into effect before April 1, 1931, revised rates recently ordered in these zones.

The commission had fixed no date for the general rates to become effective. It did, however, expect long and short haul rates to be made effective by November 1, 1930. Later this date was postponed to February 1, and today until April 1.
