

Notre Dame and Trojans Clash in Annual Game

BATTLE OF GREAT
FOOTBALL TEAMS
ATTRACTS 90,000

Betting Favors Southern
Californians; Rockne
Without Services
of Mullins.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6.—Southern Californians, in and out of the university, were more football-minded than ever before today as two great teams impatiently awaited game time. The fifth city with difficulty restrained its enthusiasm as Notre Dame and Southern California stood by for the signal to set off the fireworks incident to their fifth annual battle.

Only 90,000 fortunate customers had tickets, a record crowd for Los Angeles, but many more would storm the portals of the coliseum, the battleground, if facilities permitted.

The rivalry between the Rough Riders of Knute Rockne and the Trojans of Howard Jones is short as football tradition goes but it makes up for lack of years by intensity of feeling.

Ovation to Rockne

Knute Rockne rehearsed his final "play" to his athletes with the cheers of 1,000 Southern California alumni ringing in his ears. Co-guest of honor with Jones at a monster final rally, "Rock" heard the Trojan band play Notre Dame's victory song as an almost hysterical crowd stood and yelled long and loud for the coach of the invading eleven.

"It will be no disgrace to lose to a team with such a spirit," said the coach.

"We will have a clean game, a game filled with sportsmanship. I have warned my lads against over-ambition. We are not over-ambitious in this game. There is room at the top for only one great team, and I say in all sincerity that it does not make a great deal of difference which team wins."

Coch Jones agreed with Rockne that perhaps the two greatest teams in the country were playing and declared that in such a game nothing could be taken for granted.

"I understand Rockne has no passing attack," he said with a smile, which quickly checked the snarls of his hearers. "We are entering the game under no such delusion. Maybe he hasn't needed one, or rather perhaps when he has needed to pass, conditions have not been favorable for that type of offense."

Jones joined with Rockne in declaring that the game would develop only hard but clean play.

"I would rather win this game than any in which I have been concerned as player or coach," Jones told his players.

Bets Favor Trojans

Popular opinion gave the home team a slight edge, betting odds favoring the Trojans to the tune of 10 to 8. This, too, made a record for not since 1928 has Notre Dame been the underdog in a football game.

Larry Mullins, successor to Joe Savoldi, the battering ram who was forced to leave in the thick of battle, was definitely out of the Notre Dame lineup with injuries. Young Dan Hanley, able and game, but inexperienced, was thus placed in the position of substituting for the substitute for the devastating Savoldi.

A distressing list of injuries suffered by the Trojans in their Thanksgiving game with the University of Washington was reduced to one, and only Ray Snodgrass, an end, was definitely out of commission today. Dutch Wilcox, sturdy flankman, was ready to start but could not be expected to enlist for the duration of the war. He was hurt in a game with the University of Hawaii.

Game Strong Magnet

Among the thousands of ticket holders were coaches from every section of the United States, taking a holiday by going to a football game.

Every weather prospect pleased with clear skies pointing to a fast track. This, said the experts, meant there would be no advantage in the draw.
