TURKEY SHIPMENTS ENDED HERE TODAY

Five carloads of turkeys were secured in western Oregon last week by the Oregon Turkey Growers and the last two cars are being shipped out of Roseburg today. J. M. Cornutt of Riddle and Alva and Kenneth Copeland, of Oakland, left Saturday to take charge of the grading and loading at Hermiston and Redmond in eastern Oregon this week. It had been expected that four cars would be secured at those points, but information received today indicates that there will be at least five carloads. Loading is also to start this week in western Oregon for the second shipment.

HOUSE COMMITTEE SPEEDS MONEY BILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Driven at high speed by the republican leaders, the house legislative machinery took up today the annual interior department supply bill providing \$68,552,000 for the fiscal year 1932.

The bill was reported by the house appropriations committee, carrying \$5,240,000 more than the amount obtained for the current year, but \$40,000 less than recommended in the budget.

More than \$25,000,000 will have been spent on the \$165,000,000 Boulder canyon project by the end of the next fiscal year.

Fifteen million dollars was set aside for it today in the interior supply bill which the committee has speeded up the work by six months.

CHAS. P. SCHNEBLEY, PIONEER, PASSES

ELLENBURG, Wash., Dec. 8.—Charles Palmer Schnebley, 76, pioneer Oregon and Washington newspaper man, died suddenly from heart trouble Saturday night.

His father was editor of the first newspaper published in Oregon, the Speculator, at Oregon City, before the Civil war, and later founded the Ellensburg Localizer, the pioneer paper of this city.

In 1877 Schnebley was one of 20 young men who shared the grim fate of the Perkins family and helped capture Chief Moses and his band. He married Louisa Koepke of Walla Walla in 1883. She died two years ago. Five children survive.

"MOTHER" JONES AT REST IN ILLINOIS

MOUNT OLIVE, Ill., Dec. 8.—The last provision of "Mother" Jones' will has been carried out. She was buried today in a grave directly facing the monument erected to the miners who gave their lives in the Virden riot near here 32 years ago, and whose sacrifices brought about the eight-hour day in Illinois mines.

The funeral rites for "Mother" Jones who devoted nearly sixty of her 100 years to improve labor conditions were simple, in keeping with her request. The Rev. J. W. R. McGuire, president of St. Victor's college, Kankakee, Ill., long a personal friend of "Mother" Jones, conducted the service at the church of the Ascension.

Thousands were unable to gain admittance to the church, which was jammed to the doors. The services were brought to them by loud speakers.
