

ALL TICKETS FOR BENEFIT WEEK ARE REPORTED SOLD

The committee in charge of the Benefit Week ticket sale conducted by the Auxiliary of the Umpqua Post of the American Legion, announced this morning that every one of the 400 tickets donated to the ladies by the management of Hunt's Indian theatre had been sold. time is not here for discussion of amendments," he said.

President Thompson challenged what he said was a prevalent opinion that agriculture's troubles were due to over-production and blamed faulty distribution.

Potential Buyers Idle

"In terms of human need there is no surplus," he continued. "In our great cities today are hundreds of thousands of men and women, walking the streets, idle. Factory doors are dark and multitudes are hungry. There are today, too, millions of our people in need of every product of those factories and there are millions of dollars worth of farm products rotting in the ground because there is no market for that produce. The fault cannot be explained by the word 'surplus.' On the one hand are millions needing food and without the wherewithal to get it—on the other hand millions desiring the products of the hungry city workers."

Single Crop Areas Hit

He agreed, however, that the great single crop areas where bulk market surplus crops were produced should be broken up, saying this was particularly true of wheat and cotton areas.

He said that sub-marginal land should be removed from competition with what he referred to as properly developed farming, and advocated a new land policy for the United States that would remove from competition lands he said should be under cultivation.

He commended the activities of the Federal Farm Board in stabilizing the wheat crop and said the same effort should be applied to other crops, particularly to corn.

Transportation, he said, was an important factor in the distribution of agriculture and the country demanded the fullest co-ordination of rail, water and highway facilities in carrying the output of the farms to the market.

With regard to the agricultural marketing act, he said any amendment must be done by its friends and not by "its enemies, who are legion."

SUSPECTED SLAYER OF WOMAN JAILED

GREELEY, Colo., Dec. 8.—The puzzling disappearance of Miss Enid Marriott, 25-year-old Wiggins, Colo., school teacher, which has appeared as an unsolved mystery, was again occupying authorities today with Melvin G. McClanham, 48, Mitchell, Nebraska, farmer, held in jail here in connection with the case.

Sheriff Johnston declined to discuss the arrest except to say he received a letter two weeks ago which intimated the Nebraska man might have knowledge of the teacher's disappearance.

Efforts to locate Miss Marriott have been unavailing. She has not been seen since the night of November 16 when she alighted from a Denver train at Wiggins. A man stood beside a parked car on the station platform. The sheriff's office at Fort Morgan said McClanham's car corresponded in some respects to the one seen at Wiggins the night the teacher dropped from sight.

A hat box identified as belonging to Miss Marriott and containing some of her personal effects was found several days ago on the bank of an irrigation ditch near Fort Morgan. This strengthened the theory held by some officers the woman had been slain.

RETIRED FIREMAN EXPIRES OF BURNS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—Daniel R. Seawell, 65, retired captain of the Portland fire department and an invalid, died last night of burns resulting when his bed clothing caught fire from a match he had struck to light a cigar—a danger against which he had cautioned many people during his career.

parishioners rushed forward through the aisles. The former judge was pushed and kicked. Several detectives broke into the struggling mass and propelled the victim to a side door. The bishop continued his prayer with his back to the scene.

"He lied about me," shouted Lindsey as he was forced along. "He had no right to lie about me. This is neither a house of justice nor a house of God."

Then the church rang with exclamations. "Lynch him," screamed a woman. "Throw him out," cried a man. "Punch him," said another, and some one did. One woman exclaimed, "God bless you, Bishop Manning."

While the police were putting Lindsey in a taxi cab a score or more of the congregation surged around them, denouncing Lindsey and threatening him.

Book Is Denounced.

In his sermon the bishop termed Lindsey's latest book "The most filthy, insidious and cleverly written piece of propaganda ever published in behalf of lewdness, immorality, adultery and unrestrained sexual gratification." The bishop said Lindsey's teachings were "contrary to the plain principles of Christian morality; it was the duty of the clergy 'to brand it (his teaching) as the foul and wicked thing that it is.' Lindsey 'stands openly and publicly for legalized free love under cover of the term companionate marriage.'"

Lindsey sat quietly through the sermon, taking copious notes. He entered the edifice unnoticed and took a seat up front with his lecture manuscript.

The bishop refused to make a complaint after Lindsey reached the station house, but a policeman did so and the prisoner was released on his own recognizance. Arthur Garfield Hays appeared as his attorney. The formal charge was disorderly conduct.

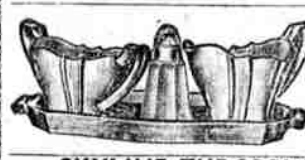

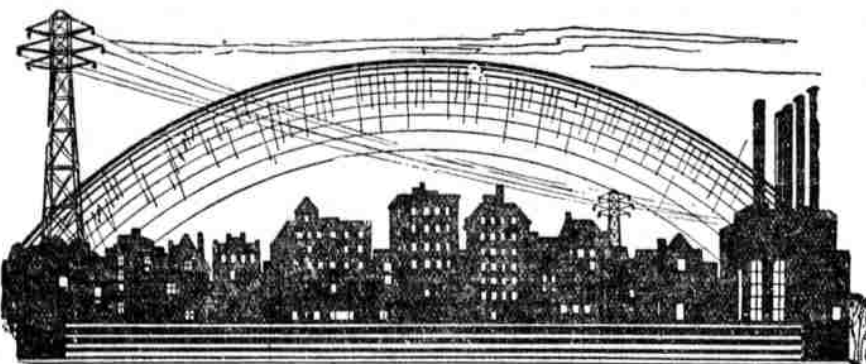
