PIONEER OF 1853 DIES AT OAKLAND

Mrs. Mary Hall Smith, 82, mother of Mrs. C. L. Chenoweth, Oakland, and Mrs. G. B. Tillinghast, Los Angeles, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Chenoweth, late last night after a long illness. She was born in Illinois, June 7, 1848, and with her parents, Dr. and Mrs. Langley Hall, crossed the plains in 1853. After spending the winter of '53 and '54 in the Willamette valley, they moved to Douglas county and settled in what is known as English settlement, east of Oakland. She was married to J. B. Smith, who conducted the first hardware store in Old Oakland, December 1, 1868. Her husband passed away several years ago. Besides her two daughters, she is survived by two granddaughters, Miss Ruth Chenoweth, Oakland, and Mrs. E. N. Crosby, and one great granddaughter, Mary Alice Crosby, of Los Angeles. Also one sister, Mrs. G. A. Taylor, Portland, and one brother, Chas. M. Hall, Oakland. Mrs. Smith had never been separated from her daughter, Mrs. Chenoweth, until death. Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. at the home in Oakland. Arrangements are in care of H. C. Stearns of the Douglas Funeral Home.

CONVICTED SOVIET PLOTTERS SPARED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MOSCOW, Dec. 8.—The Soviet central executive committee today commuted the death sentences of the five engineers convicted of a plot to overthrow the soviet regime to ten years imprisonment. Sentences of ten years imprisonment passed on the remaining three defendants in the unusually dramatic trial which was broadcast from one end of the soviet union to the other, were reduced to eight years. All the newspapers in Moscow came on the streets late today for they published the long verdict in full and devoted what was left of their space to editorials denouncing these eight men as the tools of foreign capital. The proletarian court has published the bitterest enemies of the laboring class, said one newspaper, "but the danger of war is not over. The workers have been caught and punished but the danger of counter-revolution has not been removed. The class enemy has not yet been exterminated."

W. E. BARTON, NOTED CLERGYMAN, DIES

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Rev. Dr. William E. Barton, congregation clergyman and author, died yesterday in a Brooklyn hospital where he had been ill pneumonia for a month. He was 69 years old. Burial will be at Foxboro, Mass., alongside his wife who died in 1925. Dr. Barton held various charges and was once professor of practical theology at Vanderbilt university, Nashville, Tenn. ERNESTINE SCHUMANN-HEINK

Madame Schumann-Heink has been busy for many months working out the exact details of her scheme. Since she became operatic counsel for the National Broadcasting company, her office has been flooded with appeals from young men and women begging her for an audition. Some of the letters touched the great singer deeply, recounting as they did the sacrifice that the writers had made to continue their vocal studies. Would-be operatic artists and concert singers begged Madame Schumann-Heink for an audition, promising to abide by her decision, should she declare that their vocal equipment was not sufficient to warrant anything but parlor appearance. Other letters asked what the chances were of some personal lessons from the famous teacher.

At last a scheme has been arrived at by which it is hoped that America's best and most promising young singers will be given musical training and help for their career. Not only is Madame Schumann-Heink going to grant auditions, but she herself is to select and personally train 40 of the most promising voices, and guide them over the most difficult road that confronts almost every aspirant for success as a musician.

The great singer has planned an ambitious program, something that she says will keep her busy the next five years. She does not mind who comes to sing for her, her only condition being that the applicant's financial situation is such that she cannot afford to pay for lessons. Only women are to be trained by Madame Schumann-Heink, who insists that women are easier to teach and more tractable than men. The women chosen will have the benefit of the guidance and experience of the great singer. And in order to make her pupils fit for early public appearances, she will present them in a series of early public auditions at New York's Steinway Hall. Three concerts will be monthly, and will begin probably next January. * * * Madame Schumann-Heink is enthusiastic at the prospect of doing something that has always been one of her strongest desires. During all her years of triumph the singer has never forgotten her early years of struggle, and she is anxious to give her genius to do something constructive for the young women singers of America. Her scheme should contribute materially to America's future in the world of music.—Alice Alden in a news story from New York, Sept. 15, 1930.

NAVY HEAD TELLS OF SERVICE NEEDS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Secretary Adams sailed straightway in to a statement of the wants of the navy for men and money today in his annual report.

Addressing President Hoover, he called for more man power, better pay and promotions at regular intervals to prevent the "stagnation" of officers through long periods in the same grade.

The navy secretary pointed out that the present level of compensation was 11 per cent above that received in 1905, but said the cost of living had more than doubled since that time.

Other legislative proposals for which he advocated congressional approval included: Authorization to modernize the battleships New Mexico, Mississippi and Idaho; Establishment of a naval airship base on the Pacific coast; Guarantees for conservation of the naval petroleum and oil shale reserves, and

Bans against photographs, maps or sketches of vital military and naval defense installations and equipment.

The increasing importance of aviation to the naval forces was evident throughout the report. A 6-plane patrol unit will be added to both battle and scouting fleets, and two scouting squadrons of 20 planes and 12 planes, respectively, will be attached to new light cruisers.

U. S. AIMS TO BAN BOOZE TO INDIANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The bureau of Indian affairs believes the Indian is particularly susceptible to the use of intoxicants which it says: "Not only renders him unfit for painful occupation, home life, or other useful and proper activities, but arouses his criminal instincts and makes him a menace to society in general." Therefore the interior department supply bill for next fiscal year carries \$100,000 for suppressing liquor traffic among the 30,000 Indians and provides \$100,000 for salaries of 265 Indian police on reservations.
