FRANK BATEY PUTS UP FIGHT AGAINST PAIR OF OFFICERS

Frank Batey, well known resident of the city, was arrested last night by City Officer Ray Bruach, charged with being drunk, and was turned over to the county authorities. Batey, when arrested on Court street, near the courthouse, put up a hard battle. Deputy Sheriff McCabe was called to assist the city officer in handling the man, and considerable difficulty was encountered in setting him into the county jail, where he continued resistance until forcibly subdued. A charge of possession of liquor still hangs over Batey as a result of a previous arrest, when a barrel of liquor was found in his home, following his arrest on a charge of drunkenness. At that time he was allowed to plead to the lesser charge of intoxication, and the possession charge was not prosecuted. The old complaint may be revived as a result of this second arrest, the officers state, and a more severe penalty may be imposed. District Attorney Guy Gordon is out of the city, and the matter will be referred to him upon his return.

ACCUSED LAWYERS INSIST ON HEARING

(Associated Press Local Wire) SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10 — For the reason that the defendant attorneys insist upon a sitting of the charges made against them the supreme court has denied a motion by Fred C. Worrall of Tillamook for dismissal of his disbarment proceeding against eight lawyers of Portland, Tillamook and Hillsboro. The court, however, has requested the referees to postpone the hearing, scheduled to begin in Portland today, until Attorney General Van Winkle can make an investigation and decide whether he should prosecute the case. The defendant attorneys are H. T. Iotts, George P. Winslow, A. A. Hall and Claude Barrick of Tillamook, E. P. Teece of Hillsboro, J. P. Kavanagh, Jay Bowerman and James L. Conley of Portland. The charges grow out of an estate matter in which Worrall was interested. Since the charges have been made the defendants insist that they be heard.

SINCLAIR LEWIS RECEIVES MEDAL

(Associated Press Local Wire) STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Dec. 10. — Sinclair Lewis, red haired first citizen of Sauk Center, Minn., today received from the hands of King Gustave of Sweden the 1930 Nobel prize for literature. The creator of George G. Hobbitt was the center of interest despite the presence of the distinguished winners of Nobel awards in other fields. His vigorous personality has seized the popular imagination of all Sweden. Dr. Karl Landsteiner, of New York, winner of the award in medicine, was there with Sir Chandrasekhara Venkata Raman, of Calcutta, India, winner of the physics award, and Professor Hans Fischer, of Munich, who received the prize in chemistry. King Gustave, other members of the royal family and a group of Stockholm's most distinguished citizens applauded the address of presentation and acceptance.
