SERUM GIVEN TO NINETEEN CHILDREN

Since the establishment of a toxin-antitoxin clinic by the Douglas county health unit a month ago, nineteen children have received immunization against diphtheria, according to Dr. D. R. Shoenaker, health officer. The clinic is conducted Saturday morning at ten o'clock and the immunizations are given for thirty cents, the cost of the serum. Three injections of the serum, given one week apart, are required to complete the inoculation. Because the person receiving the serum is not immunized against diphtheria until approximately five months later, it is necessary that every child receive the serum at once in order to resist the disease in the face of an epidemic.

The youngest child to receive toxinantitoxin in the clinic during the month was seven months old. Very slight, if any reaction is experienced, so parents need not fear

MORTENSON ESTATE YIELDS HEAVY TAX

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—From the \$4,800,000 fortune left by Jacob Mortenson, lumberman of Klamath Falls, Ore., and prominent steamship operator, the government will receive \$361,172 inheritance tax, \$10,000 income tax, and the state of Oregon will get \$172,000 inheritance tax.

The final accounting was filed in probate court here late yesterday.
