THE telephone company announces that it will spend \$40,000,000 for extensions and improvements to its service on the Pacific Coast next year.

More evidence that BIG MONEY has faith in the future of this country out here, and isn't afraid to back its faith with cash.

ONE of the very newest developments in industry is "dry ice," made by liquefying carbonic acid gas under pressure.

This "dry ice" melts without moisture. It has a temperature considerably colder than 100 degrees below zero, as compared with 32 degrees above zero, which is the temperature of frozen water.

Smaller quantities of this extremely cold ice are required, thus reducing transportation costs.

SOUTHERN Oregon has almost limitless quantities of carbonic acid gas, from which this "dry ice" is made.

SENATOR CAPPER, of Kansas, has introduced in congress a resolution to authorize distribution to the needy of 40,000,000 bushels of wheat held by the grain stabilization corporation.

It was the regular practice in Rome, more than twenty centuries ago, to distribute to the needy the surplus grain of Africa.

Here is something worth thinking about: The result of this public distribution of grain was to create in Rome a great class of people who would rather accept the food GIVEN by the government than to GET OUT and WORK for food on their own account.

AN emergency, of course, is an emergency, and must be met in the best way that comes to hand at the moment. Hoover is always an emergency. People who are hungry MUST BE FED!

But we should guard very carefully against establishing the principle of giving alms except in emergency cases involving dire need. Giving alms promiscuously has a tendency to create a professional pauper class, and we want no professional pauper class in this country.

South Jetty Plan for Umpqua River Halts

RESULTS OF NORTH BANK JOB AWAITED

Construction of the south jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua river is not favored by the government engineers until it is determined whether the completion of the north jetty, coupled with dredging, is adequate to maintain the projected depth of the channel, according to a telegram received this morning by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce from Senator Charles L. McNary. The senator states that he has requested additional information, which he plans to present to the board of engineers, showing the necessity for the south jetty and urging its completion.

The Roseburg chamber recently wired Oregon senator, McNary, asking that the south jetty project be given the full endorsement and active support of the Oregon delegation.

GRID GAME SPAT LEADS TO DIVORCE

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—An echo of the enthusiasm that attended the Notre Dame-Southern California football game last year was heard in a Chicago court room yesterday when Mrs. Bella Ogden was awarded a divorce from John Wesley Ogden, wealthy descendant of a pioneer Chicago family.

OGDEN, reported to be living at Pasadena, Cal., is the beneficiary of three trust funds, the latter of which was for \$1,000,000, established by his mother, Mrs. Anna Ogden Austin.

NOTED HUNTER KILLS BRIDE AND HIMSELF

F'TALL, Southern Rhodesia, Dec. 12.—Dr. R. L. Magoon, noted American big game hunter and his wife, Audrey, were found dead in their bedroom today.

Police said they were working on the theory that Dr. Magoon attacked his wife with some heavy instrument and then killed himself.

BULLETS FLY ON EUGENE STREETS
EUGENE, Dec. 12.—Two shooting scrapes livened Eugene's streets last night.

RAY Norman, lumberjack, stepped out of a cafe late in the evening and saw two officers approaching. "Don't come any closer or I'll shoot," he shouted, displaying a revolver.

Dog Gives Life to Save Master from Mad Bull

MOULTRIE, Ga., Dec. 13.—Byrd Franklin is alive but his dog is dead. The dog—a breed of bulldogs that knows no fear—gave his life to prevent a bull from goring Franklin to death.

FRANKLIN was driving the bull from a field near here when the bull suddenly turned and with a toss of horns hurled him to the ground.

TURKEYS GOING OUT IN HEAVY BATCHES
More than six thousand turkeys are to be loaded at the Edenbower warehouse today and Sunday by the Oregon Turkey Growers, according to the estimates reported this morning by McKinley Huntington, president Turkey growers meeting east of the railroad tracks made deliveries this morning while those living west of the tracks are bringing in birds this afternoon. It is expected that today's receipts will be the heaviest for an equal period of time in the history of the industry for the Roseburg district.
