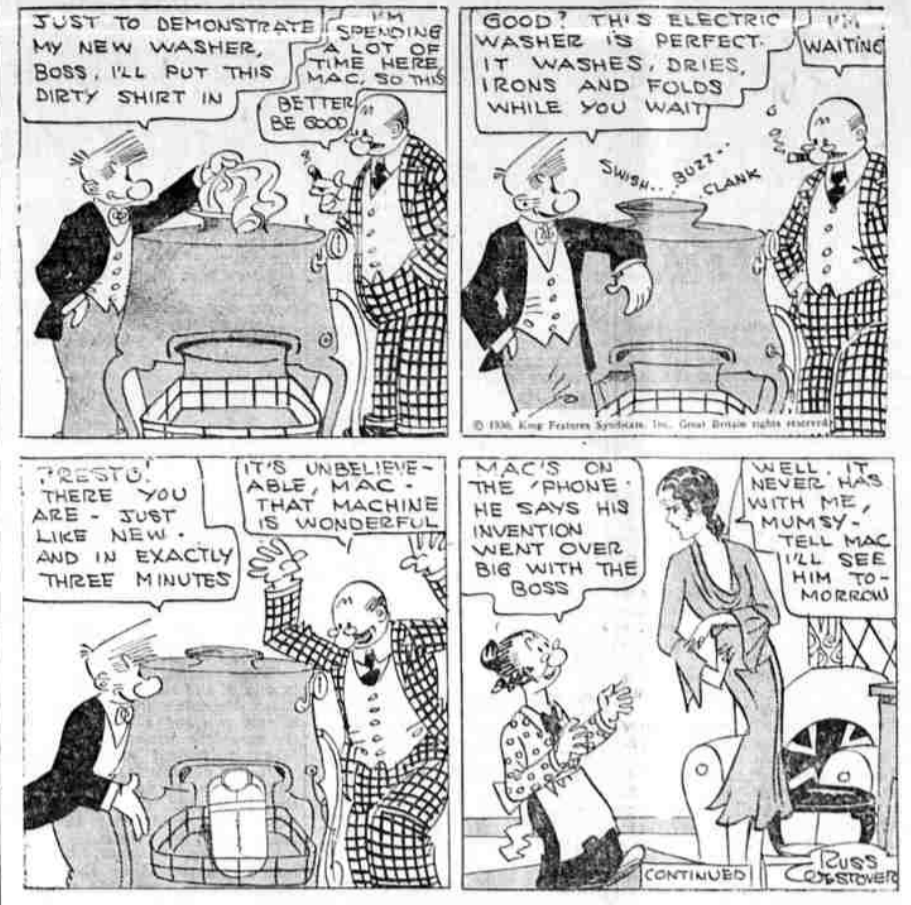

## NORBLAD TO NAME 12 FOR OFFICES

Help the consumer. Help the producer. The new wholesale quotations are: Extra 29 cents; standards, 18 cents; medium, 18 cents; and pullets, 16 cents. Fresh extras are retailing at 25 cents or less a dozen.

Wholesale butter market was steady at unchanged prices. Both receipts and demand were a bit higher.

Week-end trade in fresh fruits and vegetables was of good volume at steady prices.

**Wool favors buyers**  
BOSTON, Dec. 12.—The Commercial Bulletin of Boston tomorrow will say:

"The wool market has been in a rather bewildered frame of mind this week and prices have favored the buyers again. It appears that in all divisions of the market sales have been under the parity of foreign markets, demand has favored almost entirely the fine and half-breed wools with little interest shown in medium qualities.

"Some manufacturers report a little more interest in their products, but it is not sufficiently wide nor intensive to boost the market any. Better things are hoped for with the turn of the year."

"The foreign markets are hardly changed for the week, with respect to fine wools, although the Cape has suspended sales on account of the untoward market conditions. Combeds in South America are possibly a bit easier. London closes Saturday with prices about an opening level. Hosiery changed notably."

## NORBLAD TO NAME 12 FOR OFFICES

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 12.—No appointments that Governor Norblad is privileged to make by law between now and January 12, when his term of office expires, will be allowed to go by default, he said today. About a dozen offices, made vacant by expiration of terms, will be filled by the present governor immediately after the first of the year, although his successor, Julius L. Meier, will have authority in all cases to remove these appointments when he takes office and fill the places with persons of his own choosing.

Most of the vacancies will be in minor, unpaid boards and offices, but two will be in the major, high-salaried category. These two are state corporation commissioner, and the seat on the public advice commission now occupied by Frank J. Miller.

It is considered a safe guess that Norblad will reappoint Mark D. McCallister as corporation commissioner. McCallister was appointed by the late Governor Paterson and his term will expire January 1.

Frank J. Miller, public service commissioner whose term expires January 5, has said that he does not care for reappointment. Governor Norblad gives the hint as to whom he has in mind for the place, but says several applications are on file.

## NACKER DISCLAIMS TRAGEDY MEMORY

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 12.—Shaping by his own testimony the defense plea of insanity, Donald Nacker, 21, on trial for first degree murder, today declared he had no recollection of having shot and killed Fred Dunbar, Klamath insurance man, at Summit lake last Labor day. Dunbar, in the company of Miss Doris Bacon of Salem, was spending the holiday at the lake.

"I don't believe I'm as smart as I ought to be," Nacker summed up the review of his life. He said he was subject to "queer spells."

Previously, his father and mother had testified that he had been subject to epileptic spells since childhood.

Dunbar was shot to death while Miss Bacon looked on horrified. The slayer then tied the girl to a tree. She was able to free herself during the night and spread the alarm.

She testified Nacker said he was sorry for what he had done, and said he had mistaken Dunbar for a bear. Later, she said, he told her he had thought Dunbar was a "hawk."

The youth was on the stand today for direct examination, after which he was to undergo cross-examination by the prosecutor.
