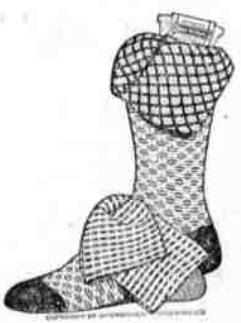

FOOTBALL between the trenches—dynamite blasts for the dinner bell—the gentle art of razzing the camp cook, and golf amid dug-outs—these were some of the recreations of a motion picture company marooned on a plain, miles from roads, for the duration of a film war.

Buster Keaton, his company, and nearly a thousand men put in two weeks in such a plight. Housed in army tents, with an army cook serving as commissary, they lived a regular army life during the filming of the trench and battle sequences of "Dough Boys," new comedy of army life, which will open today at the Indian theatre.

Because machine guns, cannon, shells and other implements of warfare were to be in active use, the camp was placed amid rolling hills in a distant location in the San Fernando valley. Actual army equipment was borrowed and actual army officers supervised the wire entanglements, and the placing of explosives with which a huge replica of a real battle was staged.
