SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS DECREASE

GLENDAL, Dec. 16.—A recently completed census of the school children in the Glendale school district made by C. J. Sether, clerk for school district No. 71, shows a decrease as compared with the census of 1929, but shows an increase when compared with the five year period preceding.

The 1930 school census had 129 boys and 136 girls or a total of 265 children. This is 54 less than 1929 when 319 children of school age resided within the district. Beginning with the year 1924 a five year average has been 256 school children. The 1930 census shows a gain of 9 as compared with the five-year period.

The big increase in 1929 was partly due to an extra influx of labor into this community occasioned by one of the local sawmills and by considerable extra railroad work during the summer and fall of last year.
