PROSECUTION OF GRAIN JUGGLERS IS DESIRED BY DEPT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—An enlarged flying squadron of confidential inquirers to track down and prepare to prosecute those responsible for irregular transactions on the country's grain markets, is desired by the department of agriculture.

This was revealed today when the agriculture department's supply bill was reported to the house, accompanied by transcript of hitherto secret hearings of the house appropriation committee.

Dr. J. W. T. Duvel, chief of the grain futures administration, advocated authority for the secretary of agriculture to control short selling of grain by foreign governments—a consequence of the recently disclosed Russian transactions in the Chicago pit.

The department's program declared its "most important" studies of grain prices, including stock market influences, other commodity markets, visible supply, grain movements and other factors, both domestic and foreign, be extended far beyond the capacity of the present organization.

"Numerous cases of irregularities have already been uncovered," said Duvel, "which require further action by the department."

Values Tumble
CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—Adversely affected by the drop in securities grain values tumbled today. Sharp breaks were in corn, which showed a maximum drop of nearly 3 cents a bushel, northern American available supplies corn were reported increased 2,912,000 bushels during the past week, and now aggregate nearly twice as much as a year ago.

Corn closed heavy 2 1/4 to 2 5/8 cents a bushel lower than yesterday; wheat, unchanged to 1/2 cent off; oats 1 1/2 cents down and provisions unchanged to 1/2 cent decline.

5-YEAR VOW KEPT BY DR. VAN DYKE

"WILDCAT" DUNCAN JURY CAN'T AGREE

PORTLAND, Dec. 16.—The twelve jurors who heard the trial of Robert Duncan, "Oregon wildcat" and radio speaker, charged with criminal libel, reported to the court today they could not agree. They had been deliberating on the case since 2 p. m. Monday.

The charges were based on an attack on Robert Mount, manager of the Portland Better Business bureau. Duncan is under six months' sentence in the county jail, imposed on his conviction in federal court on charges of violating the national radio laws by using profane language over a station.
