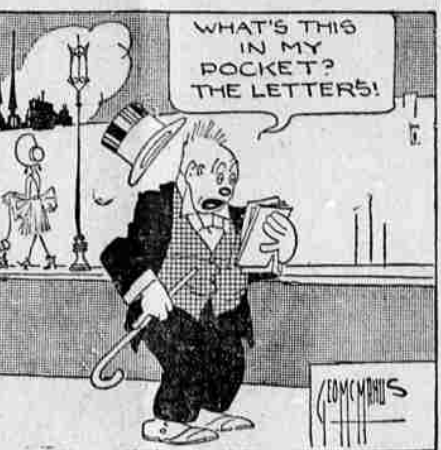
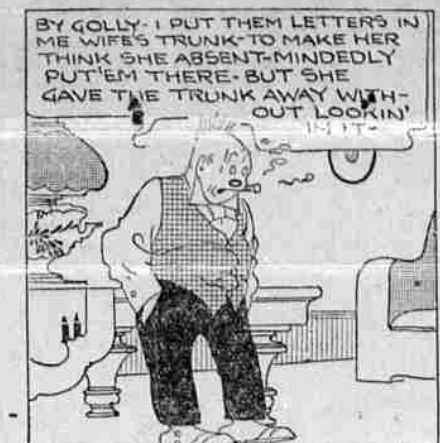

FORD WILL BUILD PLANT IN SEATTLE

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 17.—The Ford Motor company announced yesterday that an assembly plant "to cost several million dollars" will be built at Seattle, Wash.

Bids are to be opened next month.

The new plant, with capacity for 300 cars and trucks a day, will employ 2000 men. It will replace the present Seattle assembly plant, which has 115 cars a day capacity.

PORTLAND TURKEY PRICES STIFFEN

PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—A stiffening of the price list on turkeys during the past few days is attributed to the California demand together with the undersupplied trade generally, the Journal said today. The last of the carload lots of dressed turkeys out of the Oregon territory for California are being loaded or are rolling.

It is now estimated, the paper said, the crop is between 20 and 25 per cent less than a year ago. Sales of dressed turkeys are being made by distributors around 29 cents a pound for both hens and toms of top grade. Practically all business is for shipping account.

The limited local sales are being made generally at from 30 to 31 cents a pound for toms. Buyers are freely offering 28 cents for No. 1 hens and toms and are being crowded to secure their needs.

SENATE REJECTS NEW RELIEF BILL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The senate today refused by a vote of 42 to 39 to recede from amendments to the emergency \$116,000,000 employment appropriation giving funds to Alabama and Georgia for road construction and a deadlock with the house was in prospect.

House conferees refused to accept the amendments and Chairman Jones of the senate appropriation committee today asked the senate to recede from them.

They would make available more than \$2,000,000 for road construction in the flood stricken areas of these states without requiring the states to match the appropriations. Senators Black of Alabama and Georgia warned an all-day fight for their retention.

The amendments are now up to the house for action.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH TO GIVE PROGRAM

The regular monthly church night meeting of the First Christian church is to be held tonight, starting at 6:30 o'clock. The members will enjoy a potluck supper in the banquet room, after which the annual Christmas program will be given in the auditorium. The committee has arranged a very interesting program of music, readings, and other features of a Christmas nature, and there will be a Christmas tree and treat for the children.

The regular services of the church Sunday will be given over to special Christmas music, with a pipe organ vesper service of an informal nature between 3 and 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

LINDSEY FREED OF DISORDERLY CHARGE

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—A charge of disorderly conduct against former Judge Ben Lindsey was dismissed today by Magistrate Dreyer. The court dismissed the complaint made out by a police officer charging the Denver jurist with interfering with a religious ceremony when he interrupted Bishop William T. Manning's assault on companionate marriage in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine a week ago last Sunday.

Then Magistrate Dreyer ordered a new complaint drawn to be signed by a representative of the church, and when nobody came forward to sign it, he threw the case out of court.

"You are a man of intelligence, you are a lawyer, you are a judge, you knew you were in church, and you knew the law," Magistrate Dreyer told the proponent of companionate marriage.

"If you felt you were maligned you had your remedy. I always say if a man hurts my feelings I have the courts to go to. A church has a right to hold a divine service without interruption. The public should be given to know that dismissal of this complaint does not make it all right to interrupt church services."

TUBERCULOSIS TOLL HELD UNNECESSARY

This is because the measures that prevent tuberculosis also prevent many other diseases. Annihilate it and the danger of other diseases is reduced proportionately.

WM. PENN PATENT SELLS FOR \$1,900

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—The original letters patent restoring the province of Pennsylvania to William Penn in 1694, brought \$1,900 at auction here yesterday.

The patent was issued by a writ of privy seal by William and Mary of England at Westminster and contains the portrait of William, the royal crest and other armorial designs. The seal is lacking.

EDISON PUTS O. K. ON PROHIBITION

NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 17.—Thomas A. Edison expressed the opinion today that prohibition has helped the industrial and economic life of America and that its enforcement is improving daily.

His belief was set forth in answer to a questionnaire submitted to him by Rev. James K. Shields, superintendent of the New Jersey Anti-Saloon league.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—Steps to gain custody of the two small daughters of Mrs. Leone Bowles, society matron, stabbed to death here November 12, will be taken at once by the family of the dead woman, Karl Herbring, who was attorney for Mrs. Bowles, made the announcement today.

In the meantime the grand jury continued investigation of her death which resulted in the filing of first degree murder charges against Nelson C. Bowles, her millionaire husband, and Irma Loncke Paris, for three years his secretary.

Herbring said Mrs. Emma C. Glover, sister of the dead woman, called at his office yesterday to confer as to what steps will be necessary to gain custody of the children for her parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Cronkrite, of Yakima, Wash.

The children, Paty, 5, and Sally, 7 years old, are now being cared for by relatives of Bowles in Seattle.

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BOSC PEAR TREES WILL BE SET OUT

Four thousand Bosc pear trees have been ordered by Barnes and Corn, owners of Overland orchards, and are to be planted during the winter months. Between 60 and 70 acres will be planted to this variety of pears on the irrigated land

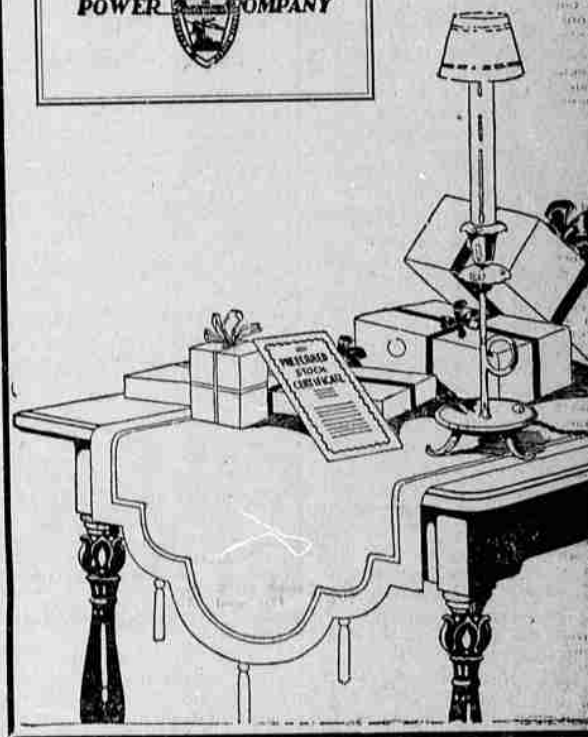
