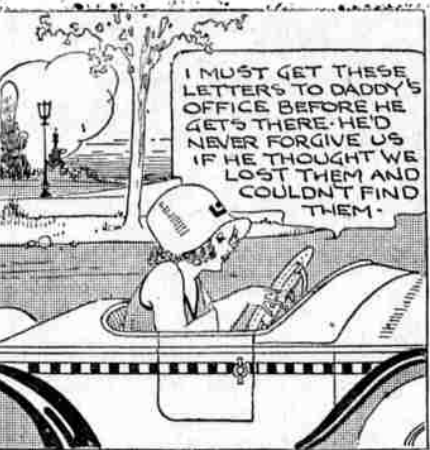

OWEN YOUNG HOLDS HOPE FOR JOBLESS

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Owen D. Young today expressed a confident work of hope that we shall yet master this dreaded disease of unemployment with all its social and economic ills.

Addressing a meeting of the executive committee of New York's emergency employment committee, of which he is a member, he said the committee was not dealing with charity, but with the equalization of the impact of a disaster.

"It is like a flood, an earthquake, or other physical disaster, impossible yet for us to foresee or prevent, but yet possible with fine cooperative spirit to alleviate its awful results," he said.

"The process is now because no one is in power and no one ought to be. We want no economic dictatorship in America any more than we want political dictatorship. We want to be free men, functioning on our own responsibility, each a part of a coordinated whole which determines our destinies for better or for worse."

TRAPPER'S MURDER REPORTED CONFESSED
