TARIFF ON CHERRIES NEEDED BY OREGON
(Associated Press Leased Wire)
CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 18.—Declaring the present tariff on sweet cherries is vital to the Oregon industry, Gordon P. Boals, junior economist at Oregon State college, urged complete support of the present rate in the face of the attack being made upon it by importers. Boals spoke to a hundred Oregon cherry growers in a conference here yesterday.

Importers, he said, will this week present objections in Washington in an attempt to gain modification of the rates.

Boals explained that while cherry production in the United States as a whole is relatively a minor industry, it amounts to about ten per cent of the fruit output of Oregon. Imports of cherries last year, he said, amounted to almost half the combined production of Oregon and California.

PROMOTIONS GIVEN TWO OCEAN HEROES
NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Two heroes of the sea, Captain A. B. (Rescue) Randall, and Captain George Fried today had won promotions.

Captain Randall, who in four dangerous situations, has saved 294 lives in mid-ocean, is the new commander of the liner Leviathan, largest ship afloat.

Captain Fried of the liner American, will succeed to the George Washington. Captain Randall's late charge, Captain Fried won world acclaim for his rescue of crews of the Antiope and Florida.

BEAR HUNT MISHAP KILLS MAN IN CURRY

GOLD BEACH, Ore., Dec. 17.—Elmer E. Miller of Pistol river, who was shot accidentally while bear hunting near Pyramid peak, by his uncle, William Wridge, of Portland, died sometime last night from loss of blood before the rescue party reached the scene of the shooting at midnight.

Wridge explained that the hunting dogs and a big bear were engaged in a terrific fight. He raised his gun and shot at the bear just as Miller ran in the line of fire to rescue one of the dogs which the bear was mauling.

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500 CHINESE REDS KILLED BY BOMBERS

SHANGHAI, Dec. 18.—Nationalist government military aviators in the 24-hour period ending at 11 o'clock tonight killed 500 communists in northern Hunan by flying over the Red-infested area and dropping bombs.

The bombing attack took place in the area in which the Reds recently slew hundreds of persons in capturing the cities of Lichow, Tsingah and Kungang.

Despite the aerial attack, the Reds continued their depredations. Red cannoniers along the Yangtze river continued to menace shipping.

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TACOMA FLASH HAS HIS FIRST DEFEAT

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 18.—The sensational rise of Freddie Steele, 18-year-old Tacoma welterweight boxer, came to a sudden stop here last night when Tony Portillo, Seattle, won a six-round verdict over the hard hitting youngster.

The two fought to a draw in Tacoma last week.

It was the Tacoma lad's first defeat since he took up the boxing game about a year and a half ago.

Able lariat, Seattle flyweight, knocked out Tony Seaman, Portland, in the third round of their scheduled six-round bout.

Orville Darr, Spokane, entered the finals of the Pacific northwest heavyweight tournament when he knocked out the highly touted giant from Missoula, Mont, Mickey Colaban, in the third round of a scheduled six-canto match. Darr will meet Eddie Gross, Seattle, for the mythical northwest crown.

ROCKNE AT CLINIC FOR OVERHAULING

ROCHESTER, Minn., Dec. 18.—Knut Rockne, master thinker of Notre Dame football, was at Mayo brothers clinic today for a checkup and overhauling made necessary by the strain of the Irish drive to the 1930 national gridiron title.

Rockne was here a year ago for treatment of a leg infection which kept him inactive physically until last spring. He plans to go to a southern resort early in January for a long rest.

HOME RUN CLOUTER WANTS PAY BOOST

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 18.—Walter Clouter, who hit more home runs for the Boston nationals last season than any Brave slugger since Babe Ruth, wants a real big league salary, and says he'll be a holdout if he doesn't get it. Berger is picking up extra money playing winter league ball here.

He disclosed he is asking President Emil Fuchs for at least \$12,000 to play on his club next year. Last season he hit 38 circuit clouts but his pay was little more than he would have received had he remained with Los Angeles, he said.

COAST LIGHT-HEAVY CHAMP LOSES LIMB

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.—Wendell Doyle, who has been receiving here the amputation of a leg of Clarence Doyle, well known amateur boxer, in a Boston hospital recently. Doyle is holder of the Pacific coast and far western light-heavyweight championships, and is champion of the San Francisco Olympic club. He was reported recovering.

PERILS OF TRAFFIC TAUGHT IN SCHOOLS
GRANTS PASS, Dec. 18.—The perils of auto traffic will be brought into the class rooms of the public schools of Josephine county by a series of lectures to be given by State Traffic Officer Hubert Hoxie, assigned to this district. Acting under instructions from Salem, Officer Hoxie will show pupils and students how danger lies in violation of traffic laws, either as an auto driver or a pedestrian. Patrols will be appointed in every school as a part of the traffic law observation.

IDAHOANS USING WHEAT FOR FUEL
