POSTOFFICE USES EXTRA CREWS TO HANDLE BIG MAIL

The Christmas mail rush is now on at the post office, and extra crews are being worked to take care of the additional business, according to C. S. Heinline, postmaster.

In order to assist patrons in getting out their Christmas mail, the carriers will make collections from all city mail boxes after 7 p. m. each evening until January 5. This service will start tonight. Usually no evening collections are made in the residential district, but from tonight until the 5th of next month collections will be made from all mail boxes in the city after 7 p. m.

Next Sunday there will be a delivery of parcels post all day, and residents are asked to assist the postman by answering door bells promptly so that there will be no unnecessary loss of time. All perishables will also be delivered Sunday.

The work is being made much more difficult this year by reason of the train unbroken silence. In past years the bulk of the incoming mail has been on night trains, and crews could work at night without interruption in making distributions. This year, however, the heavy mail comes on the morning train, so that distribution must be made simultaneously with the regular post office work. The trains are also running behind schedule as the volume of business increases, which adds to the confusion.

The post office will be closed all day Christmas, and there will be no distribution of incoming mail. Mail, however, will be dispatched as on other holidays. Star routes will be served but rural routes will not operate.

DRIVERS OF LIQUOR CARS KEEP SILENT

BALLAS, Ore., Dec. 19.—Main street was unbroken silence. L. H. Stockman and Albert B. Grant drivers of two liquor trucks captured Wednesday with a cargo valued at \$25,000, were in jail here today each under \$1,000 bail. Charges of possession and transportation of liquor have been filed against them. The men asked time to consult an attorney and the date for preliminary hearing has not been set.

State officers said today a loaded automatic pistol was taken from a handbag in Stockman's truck. He made no attempt to reach for the weapon nor to resist arrest. The two trucks contained five thousand quarts of what police declare is "high-grade imported Canadian whiskey." It is assumed the liquor was picked up on the coast.

ITALIAN PLANES DETAINED BY STORM

PALMA MAJORCA, Balearic Isles, Dec. 19.—Fifteen foot waves beating against the shores of the

Balearic islands today prevented the six Italian seaplanes, which landed here Wednesday, from continuing to Cartagena, Spain, where the other eight planes of the expedition are anchored. Fishermen say the Balearics have not been visited by such a storm as had raged here since Wednesday for more than five years. The wind has had a velocity of more than 60 miles per hour and all shipping between the islands and the mainland has been suspended. The expedition hopes eventually to cross the Atlantic to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

MAYOR THOMPSON TO SEEK 4TH TERM

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—Mayor William Hale Thompson announced

his candidacy today for a fourth term as mayor of Chicago.

The executive made known his intentions to a group of republican ward committeemen who presented a memorial at his office asking him once more to become a candidate at the republican primaries next February.

Mayor Thompson expressed his hope to rebuild the republican party in Cook county.

While he entertained the delegation of friendly committeemen another caucus of county republican leaders met at the call of Bernard W. Snow, chairman of the county republican organization, ostensibly to consider a mayoral candidate other than Thompson, or Charles V. Barnett, who had already entered the lists for the republican nomination.
