a collision with the steamer Arc-turus, arrived here today on the rescue ship Hengist with the first story of the wreck.

The ships came together in a heavy fog with a terrific crash they said. The black gang headed for the ladders on the run. When these four men reached the top of the Oberon was already down by the stern and her quarter deck was awash.

It was too late to launch a boat in the confusion on deck men were jumping overboard. The four sailors without even kicking off their shoes, slipped into the water as tern and found it so cold that they were almost paralyzed.

In the murk and dark they banged into a boat which apparently had broken loose. They climbed in, unlashed the one who was in the boat and sculled away as quickly as they could. From time to time they saw people in the water, some of them without even lifebelts, but they quickly lost these indistinct figures in the fog.

Boilers Blow Up
The Oberon was sinking fast and as the water closed over her the boilers went up in a great blast. There was strong suction as the ship went down.

The four sailors and the skipper of the Hengist said they could hear the screams of those who were fighting for their lives in the freezing water but the fog was so thick they could not see the people. Once or twice they narrowly missed running down some of the struggling men in the sea.

The seamen thought none of the Oberon's boats got away.

Lucas said he had no desire to keep the matter secret from the Nye committee, but he did want the fact kept from the democrats because of fear it would renew with vigor their effort to elect Norris.

Calls Him Democrat
When the regular republican organization appealed to him for help, he said, he realized "the national committee couldn't participate," so he paid personally for the literature.

"Norris is a defecator," he said. "He opposed Coolidge and every one of Coolidge's policies. He opposed Hoover in 1928 and supported and made speeches for Smith. If that doesn't make him a democrat, there isn't a democrat in the United States."

Still Owes On Loan
Nye wanted to know if Chairman Foss of the national committee, had not avowed the committee's support for all republican senatorial candidates including Norris.

Lucas said he did not know of any such avowal by Foss.

He said he borrowed the money to pay for the literature and still owed \$200 on the loan. Lucas said he would like to see Norris vote with the democrats in organizing the next senate "because that would make him regular."
