W. S. FISHER HEADS OREGON COUNCIL OF LAWMAKERS' BODY

Walter S. Fisher, representative to the Oregon State legislature from Douglas county, has been elected chairman of the Oregon council of the National Legislators' association. This is a national organization formed for the purpose of developing uniformity of laws in which all states or particular sections of the country are mutually interested.

It is purely a voluntary association, with no legislative authority, other than the working out of recommendations to be submitted. It is recognized, however, by legislatures as a very efficient and worthwhile organization and its recommendations are given much weight. The councils in each state, through correspondence and occasional conferences, endeavor to bring about uniformity in traffic laws and other such measures applicable to all states.

Each state has its own council, the members in Oregon being Mr. Fisher, Frank L. Morgan, and Judge McCourt of Portland, Ralph Hamilton of Bend and Hector McPherson of McMinnville. Mr. Fisher has served on this council for four years, and is now in his third term. He was appointed chairman by the national council, which selects the members in each state and names the head of the group. In the appointment of the members the council acts through the legislature, each member of the legislature receiving a slip for nomination.
