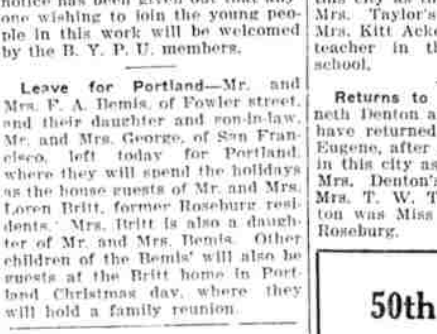

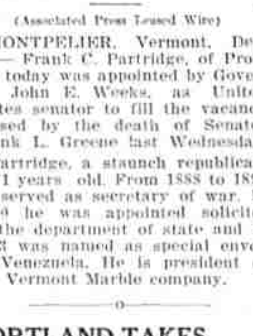

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NIGHT SCHOOL FOR MECHANICS ENDS

The night school for automotive mechanics was brought to a successful close last evening. The course covering essentials of maintenance work has been conducted under the auspices of the state department of vocational education and the local schools, with Kenneth Beach supervising.

Mr. M. L. Granning, of the Oregon State college, acted as instructor during the latter part of the course. Mr. Granning was well pleased with the progressive attitude of the men and the high standard of ability among them.

Nineteen men were in regular attendance, all of whom are engaged in automotive work in the immediate vicinity of Roseburg. It was the expressed opinion of those in attendance that their time was spent profitably and much good gained from their contacts and associations. It was hoped that this same work could be done annually during the dull season.

Before final closing light refreshments were served and the group resolved themselves into a permanent organization for the promotion, acquaintance and the dispensing of general trade knowledge. The organization is to be known as the Umpqua Automotive Trades association. Mr. Pancher was elected president and Mr. Kenneth Beach, secretary-treasurer.

TWO OUSTED FROM U. S. POWER BOARD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 — Solicitor Charles A. Russell and Chief Accountant Frank V. King, of the federal power commission, today were removed from office in the first executive order of Chairman Smith.

The action was taken under the terms of the water power act providing for reorganization of the commission, which granted the incoming commissioners power to appoint or reappoint officials of the commission.

The notification followed a recent action of the attorney general that the new commission could refuse to reappoint officials. Shortly before the chairman acted, Frank E. Bunker, executive secretary of the commission and a storm center for some months, resigned.

CAROL AND HELEN STILL IN DISCORD

BUDAPEST, Dec. 23 — Word came across the Rumanian frontier today that King Carol and his divorced wife, Queen Helen, have reached a crisis in their domestic affairs, and reports are circulating that King Alexander of Yugoslavia had postponed an intended visit to his royal brother-in-law on a hint from the dowager Queen Marie.

Marie, the report runs, fears that her son might be driven to despair by any further interference in his affairs from outside.

OVER 12 PERISH IN LONDON'S FOG

LONDON, Dec. 23 — At least four men walked blindly into canals or streams and were drowned during the great fog, one of the worst in the history of the city, under which London and its environs were buried last night and early today. The total death from various accidents due to the heavy mist today numbered well over a dozen.

Three of the drowning victims were more than 70 years old.

Today the fog had lifted in many of the affected sections.

VANCOUVER CITIZEN DIES IN 106TH YEAR

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 23 — Joseph Dubouque, born in Montreal, 106 years ago, one year before Fort Vancouver was established and beyond the draft age when the Civil war began, died yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ethel Frances.

He had lived here for four years, but had been a miner in Michigan most of his life. He ran away from home when he was 13. His wife died 50 years ago. Four children and many grandchildren survive him.
