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BUFFALO SKELETONS FOUND IN OREGON

 PORTLAND, Dec. 26 — The controversy that has long existed among naturalists, whether or not Oregon was the natural habitat of the buffalo, apparently has been settled in favor of those who held the plain animals roamed Oregon's ranges in great numbers.

Stanley G. Jewett, of Portland, predatory animal control chief for the government's biological survey, reported to his office here yesterday that receding waters of Malheur lake in eastern Oregon have uncovered more than forty buffalo skeletons. The discovery was made by Vernon Bailey, government naturalist.

The skeletons have been hidden by the water for at least 75 years, Bailey said. They were found in groups, indicating, he believes, the animals died in partial herd formation.

A movement has been under consideration for some time to establish a buffalo herd in eastern Oregon.
