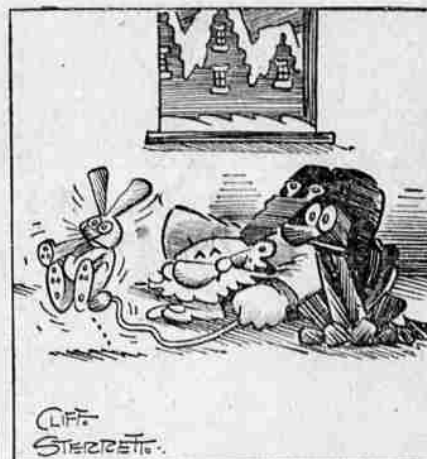

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COACHES REJECT BEZDEK'S PROGRAM

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—The Association of Football Coaches of America, in annual meeting today, in effect rejected proposals for sweeping reforms before the body by Hugo Bezdek of Penn State.

Warning his audience the audience must take the initiative in changing college gridiron methods or face the probability of having "reformers forced upon them," Bezdek, as chairman of the committee on "stabilization," recommended:

Centralization of all college athletic education, adoption of physical budgets, abolishment of spring football practice and no fall workouts until Sept. 15, establishment of football coaches as bona fide members of college faculty.

Bezdek's report was tabled by an approximate 4 to 1 vote after some heated debate. In the course of which Chick Meehan, head coach at New York university, characterized
