

\$200,000 IN GEMS INVOLVED IN THEFTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—About \$200,000 in jewelry, lost, strayed or stolen in a Pullman compartment, a night club and a theatre, engaged the attention of police today.

Mrs. Edgar F. Luckenbach, wife of the steamship owner, reported that gems valued at between \$70,000 and \$200,000 were stolen from her on a recent trip to Palm Beach, Fla. Miss Marie de Carle, of Park avenue society, reported the loss of \$10,500 jewelry on a night life tour. "Texas" Guinan said that her \$2,500 mesh bag disappeared at the Ethel Barrymore theatre Saturday night.

Mrs. Luckenbach is believed to have been followed when she boarded a train at the Pennsylvania terminal on December 19. A string of pearls valued at \$100,000 and a pearl necklace valued at \$20,000 were among the loot.

Miss de Carle said she discovered the loss of her valuables the morning after a tour of four night clubs on December 21. They included one necklace of 197 pearls with a diamond clasp, worth \$14,000, and a clip set with 35 stones, worth \$2,500.

Miss Guinan told police the mesh bag was taken out of her tap as she was applauding.

Police are investigating also the theft of \$10,000 in jewelry from the West 80th street home of Henry Slack, a stock broker, and \$5,000 worth from the West 82nd home of Philip A. S. Franklin Jr., son of the president of the International Mercantile Marine, both in the last two weeks.

COURT HALTS SWAT AT AMENDMENT 18

BOSTON, Dec. 29.—United States Judge James A. Lowell today interrupted the argument of counsel assailing the constitutionality of the 18th amendment and said that the supreme court already had decided that the amendment was legally proposed and adopted.

Judge Lowell halted a lengthy argument by Essex Abbott, a former United States attorney, who was urging the quashing of a 10-year indictment on the ground that the 18th amendment was unconstitutional, and said that the supreme court already had ruled on the point.

"That is my master's voice," Judge Lowell said. "How can I rule otherwise? I have no power and Judge Clark of New Jersey had no power to do otherwise than uphold the decision of the supreme court already had ruled on the point."

The testimony developed that Grace, in one year, received more than a million dollars as one year's bonus.

Opponents of Eaton charged he fought the merger because he himself wanted Youngstown to merge some time with his Republic Steel corporation and the inland company of Chicago.

KILL INTENT CHARGE TRAILS PISTOL BLOW

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 29.—Charged with assault with intent to kill, Robert Stratton, 34, of Idaho Falls, Idaho, was in jail here today with bail set at \$10,000. He is accused of having struck Miss Nedra Smith, 18, over the head with a pistol-butt. They had known each other several weeks.

Police said Stratton is wanted in Idaho Falls for questioning in connection with forgery and grand larceny charges.

AVIATRIX CLAIMS NEW "HIGH" RECORD

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 29.—A diminutive Los Angeles aviatrix, Juanita Burns, claimed a new official world's altitude record for women today, as a result of a three-hour flight yesterday in which she claimed she reached a height of approximately 28,000 feet.

The woman flier said she climbed for half an hour after the last of her three altimeters stopped functioning, at 26,000 feet. An official barograph installed in her plane for the attempt will be sent to Washington for calibration by the national aeronautic association.

The present world's record is 27,418 feet, set by the late Ruth Alexander over San Diego.

AUTO ACCIDENT VICTIM FIANCE OF EX-ROSEBURG GIRL

To lose her father and her fiancé in very similar accidents taking place at locations only two blocks apart is the sad experience of Miss Cornelia Martin, formerly of Roseburg, fiancée of Hal H. Hall, victim of an auto accident Friday. Miss Martin left Roseburg only a short time ago, after being employed at the Silverbrook Grill in this city for several months, and has been employed in Eugene. She was to have been married to Mr. Hall, son of Chief of Police R. W. Hall in Eugene during February.

Her fiancé, who was driving a touring car, was killed when he was struck by a car driven by Mike Dutchuk, accompanied by Gaylord Morse, both of Springfield. The driver, it was claimed, ignored the stop signals and was travelling at a high rate of speed.

Two years ago Miss Martin's father, William Leslie Martin, was killed at an intersection only two blocks from where Hall was killed when a car driven by Charles Murray crashed a telephone pole, glanced off and struck Martin and carried him about 40 feet to a house. Murray, it was claimed, was intoxicated, and he was only recently paroled from a 10-year sentence for involuntary manslaughter.

The text emphasized by Dr. Lowry yesterday morning was taken from 2 Chronicles, 7:14, "If my people, who are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and heal their land."

Bible Held Supreme
The evening address was an extremely interesting discussion of the inspiration of the Bible, and the speaker showed that it is attested and confirmed by prophecy, history and science.

"Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away," quoted Dr. Lowry from Matt. 24:35. "Bring me the book," said Sir Walter Scott on his dying bed. "What book?" asked Lockhart. "The Bible," there is no other book," and this he said when surrounded by a library of more than thirty thousand volumes.

"The Bible," said Dr. Lowry, "is the best loved, the worst hated, the most read and the most neglected book in the world. The ignorance of the Bible in the church is appalling, to say nothing of the outside world."

God's Word Exalted
"Therefore if we are to see a revival, local or general, it must be characterized by honoring God's Word. There has never been a great revival and never can be one without this. So then if there is to be a revival in this city it will be because we honor the 'Written Word of God,' which reveals the 'Living Word,' which is the Lord Jesus Christ, the saviour of men."

"Some are asking in these days if we can be sure the Bible is the Word of God? And you are certain by asking an important question, for if the Bible is not the Word of God, we do not know from whence we came, and we certainly do not know where we are going. Therefore it is a question of supreme importance to every one of us, whether we are in the church or out of it, saved or unsaved."

Saturday night at the armory, at 7:30 o'clock, Dr. Lowry will preach from a text taken from the Catholic Bible and the scripture lesson will be taken from the same book.

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ISLAMITES SLAY 30,000 CHINESE

SHANGHAI, Dec. 29.—Details of the reported massacre of 30,000 Chinese by a Mohammedan army in Kansu province published here tonight by the vernacular press indicated the slaughter may have been worse than at first stated.

Dispatches from Lanchow, Kansu, arrived here one month to arrive here, said that in addition to the slaughter in the northwest part of that province, Islamites in the southern portion went on the warpath late last month, killing all the old men and women and enslaving the girls.

Other advices said bandits and Mohammedans had carried out several massacres in various parts of

Kansu in recent months and that no news of these murderous orgies had been allowed to go out.

What has happened in Kansu province this month remains conjecture.

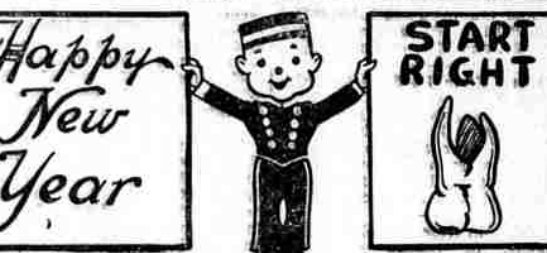
