

GOD'S JUDGMENT SUBJECT OF TALK BY DOCTOR LOWRY

Evangelist Also Occupies
Time Scoring Manner
of Living by Some
Church Members.

REVIVAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Evangelist Oscar Lowry, preaching at the armory last night in the union revival campaign, spoke on the subject, "Judgment Must Begin at the House of God," using as his text, 1 Peter 4, 17-18: "For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God; and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God? And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?"

"I have chosen this text as one of my first messages to you," Dr. Lowry said, "because I am fully convinced that the church, the house of God, is the place where judgment must first begin."

"I am fully convinced that the best people in the world today are in the church, but there is no denying the fact that there are many in the church who ought to be in the penitentiary, and we might as well pack our trunks and go to some other field if you expect a revival without the church members getting right with God first. Every time, when prophets prophesied revival in the history of Christendom had its beginning in the church; and if you have one in this city it will begin in the same place."

Pulpit Criticized
"First of all, I would say, let judgment begin at the pulpit. I am going to preach these preachers and myself, and then your time will come a little later on. I can imagine some of the good-for-nothing, one-horse church members saying 'That's right, give it to the preachers, they need it.' Well, don't you worry, the Lord helping me, we will get to you before we get through."

"I suppose there never was a time in the history of the church when there were more and greater temptations for the preachers to give the people what they want, rather than what they need. Consequently, there is too much preaching for the people and not enough preaching to the people, and too much preaching about sinners."

Dr. Lowry quoted from Jeremiah, Isaiah and Paul, showing that the same conditions prevailed in past times, when prophets prophesied falsely, and that Paul foresaw the time when people would "not endure sound doctrines but, having itching ears, will heap to themselves teachers after their own lusts."

"When I began preaching," Dr. Lowry said, "I was afraid I would hurt somebody's feelings; but now I am afraid I won't."

Pseudo-Christians Hit
The church member whose profession and life do not harmonize, was roundly scolded by the evangelist.

"Of course you could come and partake of the Lord's table as a perfunctory act," the speaker declared, "but if your life is not right it is of no profit to you. Here comes a woman to the Lord's table and partakes of the emblems representing the body and blood of the Lord Jesus; but see her inside of 48 hours as she is being whirled over the ballroom floor with some spindle-shanked ballet-headed dude squeezing the gizzard out of her. Yet she dares to call herself a Christian."

"Here comes a man to the Lord's table. He, too, partakes of the emblems representing the body and blood of our Lord Jesus. But see him inside of 48 hours sitting yonder in the theatre, giggling over the shame of fallen women with not enough clothing on them to flag a hand car. I want to say right here in the beginning, if you can go to the theatre and sit there and giggle over the shame of these away feeling comfortable in your own consciences, I wouldn't give five cents for your profession of religion."

agreement among railroad leaders. The new plan provides for the Virginian railway on the south and the New York Central on the north, as the boundary roads in the movement.

The interstate commerce commission, the president said, has no power to force consolidations but under the transportation act of 1920 has the power to approve such a move.

York Central would cede its interests in the Reading company, which controls the Central of New Jersey, to the Baltimore and Ohio. Thus the Nickel Plate and Baltimore and Ohio get the lines direct into New York City.

In return for its contribution, the Pennsylvania would secure trackage rights over the Nickel Plate along the south shore of Lake Erie. This was the big stumbling block to the plan, it was understood, the New York Central objecting to the Pennsylvania getting easy access to Buffalo.

Couzens Not Convinced

At the capital later, after the president's statement, Senator Couzens said he wanted to study the plan in detail before expressing any attitude on it.

The senator challenged the contention of President Hoover that the consolidation eventually would open the way for lower rates. He said such an argument was contrary to the testimony of the railroad presidents before the senate interstate commerce committee.

STAR WITNESS IN BOWLES QUIZ TALKS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 30.—Mrs. H. W. Howard, the mystery witness in the Bowles murder case, entered the grand jury chambers today. Her testimony, guarded in secrecy by the district attorney, has been termed "extremely important" by him.

The grand jury is in the fourth week of its investigation of the death of Mrs. Leone Bowles, society matron, who was stabbed to death Nov. 12. Her husband, Nelson C. Bowles, millionaire, and Irma Loucks Paris, his former secretary, are charged with first degree murder.

Before her connection with the case was made public, Mrs. Howard was attacked by two unidentified men who entered her home and threatened her with death, the prosecutor said, if she testified.

Because of injuries received when she was knocked to the floor and kicked, she could not testify at the coroner's inquest which held Bowles and Mrs. Paris responsible for Mrs. Bowles' death.

COOS BAY LUMBER SHIPMENTS DECLINE

MAITSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 30.—Coos Bay's offshore lumber shipping report for 1930, released today, shows a total movement of 81,192,835 feet for Japan, China, Australia, South America, the United Kingdom and Europe, and Mexico, compared with 82,369,998 feet for 1929, a falling off of a little more than one million feet. The failure of December's shipping to measure up to expectations accounts for the difference.

MALTA FEVER TAKES MARION RESIDENT

STAYTON, Ore., Dec. 30.—The first death from Malta fever to be recorded in Marion county occurred late Monday night when Ray F. Newby, 26, died here after a month's illness. The disease, caused by infectious abortion in cattle, was traced to a Stayton dairy herd and a number of diseased cows were disposed of. Eight cases were found in Marion county in 1929, and one in 1929, with no deaths resulting.

EX-RAIL WORKER WINS ON APPEAL

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 30.—A damage judgment of \$28,456 allowed John H. Adekun in a suit against the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, because of injuries received while employed as a brakeman for the railroad company, was upheld by the supreme court today.

Adkun was injured when he stepped off a moving train and stumbled on a collection of gravel and cinders. The court found that he received permanent injuries. Chief Justice Coshaw wrote the opinion.

U. S. REJECTS NEW GUATEMALAN RULE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—The American legation at Guatemala City, on instructions of the state department, has informed the Guatemalan government that the United States will not recognize the regime of President Orellana.

It was said on high authority that the disinclination to extend recognition to Guatemala was based on the terms of the treaty of 1927, which set forth the conditions under which new regimes in Central America may be recognized.

The attitude of the state department was asserted to be that the Orellana regime came to power through a civil coup d'etat and not under any constitutional provisions allowing recognition under the terms of the treaty.

MAJOR SHEPARD SEEKS NEW TRIAL

TOPEKA, Kas., Dec. 30.—Motions for a new trial and arrest of judgment were filed with the clerk of the federal district court here today in behalf of Major Charles A. Shepard, army medical corps officer stationed at Denver, who was convicted by a jury eight days

ago of the poison murder of his second wife at Fort Riley, Kas., in June, 1929.

Court attaches said the motions, filed by Major Shepard's attorneys, would be heard by Judge Richard J. Hopkins February 2, the date fixed for passing of sentence. The trial jury recommended life imprisonment in returning its verdict at Kansas City, Kas., Dec. 22, after a prolonged trial.

Major Shepard is at liberty under \$20,000 bond.

SOVIET SOLDIERS SHOOT 40 PRISONERS

VILNA, Poland, Dec. 30.—Reports brought here today by a group of Russian peasants who had crossed the soviet border said they and a number of others confined to a concentration camp awaiting deportation to Siberia had been fired upon by soviet soldiers when they attempted to escape.

Forty prisoners were killed or wounded, they said. About sixty were in the group which came here. They had been sentenced to Siberia, they said, for resisting collectivization measures.

WEMME HEIRS LOSE IN COURT DECISION

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 30.—Upholding a demurrer by the present trustees of the E. Henry Wemme endowment fund to the effect that the plaintiff, Wemme heirs, are without legal capacity to sue, the supreme court today affirmed Judge Robert Tucker of the circuit court for Multnomah county in a case in which removal of the trustees was unsuccessfully demanded. The opinion was written by Chief Justice Coshaw. Justice Rand is preparing a dissenting opinion. Justice Beist and Kelly did not participate in the decision.

GIRL'S DEATH IS LAID TO PHYSICIAN

PORTLAND, Dec. 30.—The preliminary hearing of manslaughter charges against Dr. George Buck, Portland physician, involving the death December 18 of Miss Helen Cleator, 29, was started in municipal court here today.

Mrs. W. C. Cleator, mother of the dead girl, charged Dr. Buck with performing an illegal operation on the girl, which resulted in her death. Dr. Buck told detectives he performed the operation in an attempt to save the girl's life.

THREE YOUTHS LOST ON HOLIDAY JAUNT

KEY WEST, Fla., Dec. 30.—The island studded tip of the Florida peninsula today yelled the whereabouts of three youths, whose 13 foot fishing boat was found abandoned yesterday, three days after they set out from here on a holiday excursion.

The boys are Gilbert Thompson and Carl Nelson, each 19, who came here recently from Detroit to visit their parents, and Overton Albury, 16.

The crew of a fishing boat reported seeing the boys about 12 miles south of here some hours after they embarked from Key West Saturday and search for the youths was concentrated in that vicinity.

BANDITS IN CHINA WRECK TRAIN; 80 DIE

SHANGHAI, China, Dec. 30.—Eighty persons were killed and forty injured Saturday in the derailment of a train by bandits on a branch line of the Peiping-Mukden railway in southwest Manchuria.

The bandits removed fishplates on the ties. The bursting of a locomotive boiler started a fire which was fed by gasoline in one of the cars and several coaches were destroyed, burning many passengers to death. The bandits hijacked the train and removed twenty passengers whom they were holding for ransom.

BLOW FROM AUTO KILLS WOMAN, 77

PORTLAND, Dec. 30.—Mrs. Inez Huff, 77, Portland, was killed last night when struck by an automobile driven by J. O. Whitney. Investigating officers said she had been dragged fifteen feet by the automobile.

Whitney was arrested on a charge of involuntary manslaughter. His defective automobile was declared a menace on streets of traffic.

FARM BOARD HIT BY TEXAS GROUPS

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 30.—Resolutions attacking methods of the federal farm board were passed today at a mass meeting of farmers sponsored by the Farmers' Marketing Association of America and the Farmers' Union of Texas.

The farm board was asked to purchase two out of every three bales of cotton produced by the farmer at a fixed price of 18 cents per pound, the farmer to retain the third bale for whatever disposition he chose.

The resolutions called on the farm board to "quit dealing in futures" and suggested it reverse its policy and take into affiliation all co-operative marketing associations properly organized under the law.

It was charged that the farm board had adopted collective selling instead of co-operative marketing and that "the board and its allies have entered the futures markets and speculated and gambled in farm products on a large scale, calling it co-operative marketing."

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
