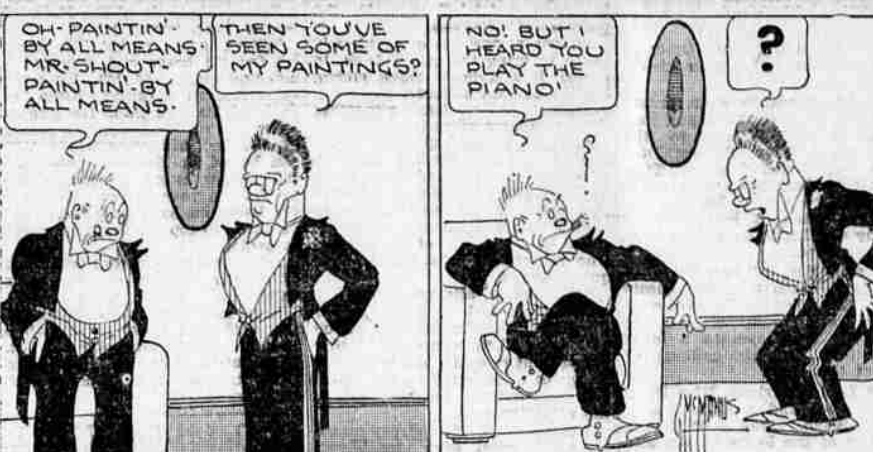

BRINGING UP FATHER



BRITISH SLAUGHTER REBELS IN BURMA

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

RANGOON, Burma, Dec. 30.—Savage rebels of the rice swamps and jungle met British soldiers in a fierce battle through the Tharawaddy forest today, melting into the woods under a withering machine gun fire, but fighting on in the crazed bravery of desperation. Fragmentary reports from the jungle fastnesses where the men of the jungle, clad in picturesque uniforms which look like blue pajamas, had barricaded themselves indicated that the insurgents had lost between 50 and 100 men, with many more wounded. No casualties were reported by the government forces.

The British were said to have surrounded the rebels in a wild, hilly region where there is little food and less water. Presumably the enemy was making its last stand under the mysterious "master mind" who is believed to have directed the raids which have terrorized the countryside for two weeks. As though to show that their spirit still was unconquered despite their increasingly precarious position, the native forces accomplished a brilliant sortie last night, burning down one village on the edge of the jungle after its inhabitants had fled in panic. Shwekyion, a Burmese name translated as "The golden crow," is said by some of the rebels captured to be the mysterious leader who has directed their depredations. His object, it is said, is to make himself king of Burma.

HIGHER STATUS FOR JOURNALISM URGED

BOSTON, Dec. 20.—Professor John E. Drewery of the University of Georgia today opened the annual conference of the American association of teachers of journalism with a plea that journalism be made a profession.

Prof. Drewery, who is president of the association, also advocated that the course in the high schools of the country on the appreciation of the newspaper and magazine.

"To require of every American high school and college student a course in the appreciation of the newspaper and magazine would be a drastic move," he said, "but it would be a move of inestimable value both for him and for us. It would go far in correcting the public picture of journalism, and consequently, I think, would exalt the popular estimation of newspapers and newspaper work."

"Education in journalism, which plays so vital a role in the life of every man, is as desirable for the masses as is education in history, in civics, in the sciences and in the languages."

Advocating financial returns in proportion to required training, Prof. Drewery said:

"Before newspaper work is to be wholly attractive to ambitious and intelligent youngsters, there must be evolved a new theory of economics in journalism."

"Then, and only then will newspaper work cease to be a stepping stone to other things which lure the stars of the city room with the magnetism of cash."

OVERBECK & COOKE DIVIDEND COMING

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Dec. 30.—A 5 per cent dividend on the salvage from the defunct brokerage firm of Overbeck & Cooke, will be paid probably before the first of February, J. C. Gillingham, trustee in bankruptcy, said today.

A total of 20 per cent on the dollar, 15 per cent of which has already been paid, will be turned over to creditors of the firm, failure of which in 1928 brought tragedy and loss of accumulated savings to many Oregon homes.

Refund by the internal revenue department of \$49,519 for over-assessment of the firm for 1924, 1925 and 1926 is responsible for the 5 per cent dividend to be paid.

When this is disbursed approximately \$105,000 will have been paid to 700 creditors of the company.

The company failed with a loss to clients and creditors estimated at \$2,190,999.

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HEAVY TAXES AND IDLE HOST SEVERE JOLTS TO GERMANY

Returning Roseburger Says Conditions Abroad Far Worse Than Those in America.

People in the United States have no cause to feel badly about the so-called business depression, according to H. W. Kleeman, of the Corvallis creamery, who recently returned home from a six-months' visit in Europe. Mr. and Mrs. Kleeman and their daughter, Margaret, left in May to visit Mr. Kleeman's mother and other relatives in Germany, and also went to Switzerland, Italy and Austria before returning home.

Conditions in the United States are so much better than in Germany that there should be no reason for complaint, Mr. Kleeman declares.

"We have no idea of what hard times and business depression means," he said. "In Germany Germany prices for commodities were high. They paid more for butter and the ordinary produce than we are paying in this country, and I was greatly surprised to find such conditions. Upon investigation, however, I found that these prices do not mean much, for they could not be sold for less. The producers in Germany today are paying, I was told, more than 75 per cent of their income in taxes, so that the prices they are receiving for commodities do not mean much, as they must immediately pay back nearly all that they receive to the government."

"Business men told me that it is almost impossible to do business because of the heavy taxes that must be paid. The factories are closed down or are working only part time, and the unemployment situation is terrible. Germany, with sixty millions of population, has more unemployed than America with one hundred million people."

"There is a great deal of political unrest. The people are not in sympathy with the new radical movement, introduced by the national socialist party, but are voting for that party as a protest against the conservative government. They feel that the government should do something to lighten the tax burden and dispose of the reparations agreement. Because the government has not been able to relieve the burden, they are showing their dissatisfaction by support of the radical candidates. I do not believe that, as a whole, Germany is in sympathy with the radical movement but the people feel that conditions are so bad that they can't be worse."

Mr. and Mrs. Kleeman, while they enjoyed their trip, were subjected to much sorrow. While en route to Germany, Mr. Kleeman's father passed away, so that it was a sorrowful homecoming. Mrs. Kleeman's father died at Medford while she was in Europe, and immediately following their return she was forced to go to the hospital for an operation from which she is now convalescing.
