SPIRITUAL NEEDS OF CITY STRESSED BY DOCTOR LOWRY

The Lowry meetings continued at the armory last night, with a good crowd, fine music and an able and telling sermon from the evangelist. A duet by Mr. Nelson and Miss Slough, the musicians of the party, was greatly appreciated. Mr. Nelson also sang a beautiful and touching solo.

Dr. Lowry's subject last night was "Some Things Needed in Roseburg," and the speaker did not spend any time on commercial or business affairs, but dealt with the spiritual life of the individual, the family and the church. The text was John 12:23, "And Jesus answered them, saying, The hour is come, that the Son of man should be glorified."

"I want to give these words a local application," said the speaker, "for I believe the hour is come that the Son of man should be glorified here in this city. Yes, we have reached a fateful hour. The battle is on, and before the smoke of it lifts there will be a Waterloo either for the hosts of darkness or for the people of God. This campaign is being watched by heaven and earth and hell. Heaven is watching to bless you, the world to deceive you, and hell to damn you."

"One of the things needed in Roseburg is a new vision of God. In Proverbs 29:18 it is said, 'Where there is no vision the people perish.' The passage in the revised version reads, 'Where there is no vision the people cast off restraint.' Why this awful sweep of crime and sin in the world today? It is because men have lost the sense of God. If you would come and ask me what I consider the greatest need of our country today, I would answer: a deeper sense of God. God is not taken into serious consideration in our business, our politics or social life. A short time ago one of the leading preachers of the south was on a train with a judge of one of the supreme courts, one of the strongest men of the south, and he got to the judge this question: 'Judge, you are a man of wide reading and broad sympathy and general information. Tell me, if you can, in a single sentence, why it is that we are having such an increase of crime in this country?' The judge said, 'I think I can do that. I think I can do it in a single sentence. Men have lost the consciousness of God.'"

"We need a new vision of God in His majesty. In His almighty power, of Him who is mighty in creation. He made the glow worms and the stars; He made dew drops and Niagara; He painted the rose leaf and the sunset. The tendency is to make much of man and little of God. We need a new vision of God in His love and justice. Many preachers all over the country are preaching what they are pleased to call 'the love of God,' to the neglect of the holiness and justice of God. Then we need a new vision of God in His love and mercy. John 3:16 is the greatest verse in the Bible, 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life.' When the average individual speaks of the love of God he means that he believes in a God of license and liberty, permitting men to do as they please, without the fear of judgment and hell. God loves the meanness man in this city, but man has the power to trample that love under his feet, and be damned in spite of God's love."

"Then I would say in the next place that the hour is come for more play and godly living in the home. There is little use of praying for the fellow running that joint until we get some of your professing Christian mothers unjoined from the card table, and that precious daughter disjointed from the hall room."

"You say, 'Yes Mr. Lowry, we do have some very worldly Christians in our city.' No, you haven't. I say you haven't a single worldly Christian. You might as well talk about a white blackbird, or a heavenly devil as a worldly Christian. I John 2:15 says, 'Have not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him.'"

"The reason the world is not joining the church today is because the church has joined the world."

"What has been the effect upon men who have had a vision of God? Read the vision of the prophet in the sixth chapter of Isaiah, 'When men see God he abhors himself. Job prided himself that he was righteous, but one day he had a vision of God. Some of you in Roseburg are living so close to hell that you can turn around and shake hands with the devil any time.'"

"If Jesus Christ is to be glorified here in your midst, the hour has come for plain preaching of God's truth."

UNION COUNTY AREA HOLDS MISSING MAN

LA GRANDE, Dec. 31.—Search in the mountains east of Union was pushed today for Manfred Alexander, 35, of Cove, who has been missing since December 16, but whose absence was not believed alarming until he failed to keep a Christmas dinner engagement with William Haefler, of High Valley.

Alexander left his home with provisions and bait for his brothers who were trapping in the Catherine creek meadows country. He progressed as far as Tom Marks' place in High Valley by noon on December 16, and continued on after lunch there. Yesterday tracks were found three miles beyond the Marks place and then lost. He had expected to reach the camp of his brothers by nightfall.

His brothers, who reported the storm on that day so severe they remained in the cabin all day, returned home eight days later to learn of Alexander's disappearance but thought he stopped some place enroute for work.

The country in which Alexander is lost is rugged, timbered and covered with considerable snow. His brothers now fear he met with some misfortune, as he was an experienced woodsman and knew the hills.
