NEW YORKERS NOISY BUT POLICE HAVE EASY TIME

NEW YORK, Jan. 1 — Young 1931 was swept into the metropolis this morning on a wave of noise as his decrepit old predecessor was hooted out of town.

The new year brought at least temporary prosperity to the city's lawless and to the army of street hawkers with tin horns and other noise making contraptions for sale. Several of the city's six millions remained quietly at home beside their radios, but other millions yielded to the impulse to go places and do things. To thousands, places meant Times square, Broadway, the Battery, and the connecting thoroughfares.

The Mecca of other thousands was a place where there was music, dancing, paper hats, ice skating in tall glasses and a good stiff cover charge. Such were night clubs, hotels, restaurants and speakeasies.

Those who found the advent of the third decade of the Twentieth century less a fête than a time for contemplation and prayer attended the watch services in scores of churches.

The crowds which packed themselves into solid masses of humanity in New York's favorite rendezvous, Times square, and other spots, were noisy but orderly. The police department had 1,000 extra men on the street, but their task was chiefly handling traffic.

Woman is shot in the neck by a man in the crowd. The New Year's welcome apparently did not inspire federal prohibition agents to unusual activity. A squad of 30 made five raids yesterday and arrested 18 persons for liquor law violations but no raids were reported during the midnight hilarity.

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SAN FRANCISCO FETE HAS INTER-RACIAL ASPECT

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1 — Re-enacting with variations that ancient festival that marked the start of the sun's return from the remotest sections of the zodiac the people of this New Year's event saluted the New Year with such vim that most of them were forced to seek repose.

Despite a rain that pattered on the pavements in rhythm with the tom toms in the cabarets the revelry inside and out evolved crescendo until midnight brought the culminating pandemonium where, in virtually every noise making device known to man participated. And how!

In all this San Francisco's Chinatown shared for the first time, abandoning not only the legends of their ancestors but the more recent usage of the nationalist government which dates its calendar from establishment of the republic in 1911. Young China, entering fully into the technique if not the spirit of the Gregorian celebration made such whoopee those who clean up after people joined with the elders of the settlement in saying "Taki Taki" or its Cantonese equivalent.

Chinatown cafes were filled with an international clientele. Neatly tuxedoed Orientals drifted about the slick floors not always with partners of their own race and saxophones whined forth perfect tagalog in the Filipino section.

Less Public Drinking. William G. Walker, prohibition administrator, said last night was the driest New Year's eve in the bay region since prohibition. He said public drinking was reduced to virtually nothing.

Captain Thomas L. Hoertkorn, in command of the city police prison said 86 men were "in stir" as drunks.

In Oakland 33 were arrested as "drunks"; eleven for possession of liquor; four for battery; two for disturbing the peace, and one for interfering with an officer. All were New Year's celebrants. Alameda and Berkeley had two each arrested for alleged drunkenness.

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Example of Modernizing Old Type Homes Offered by Local Landlord



The above picture shows three separate stages in the remodeling program undertaken by Henry Andrie of this city following his purchase of the Ida Frank property on Oak street. All three houses originally were of a type of construction identical with the building on the left, while the one on the right shows how attractively one of these houses was remodelled, the center house still being in process of completion.

The possibilities of remodeling old and poorly arranged dwellings into thoroughly modern and attractive residences have been most ably demonstrated by Henry Andrie, who is completing the third house to be built over from as many old-style structures, located on Oak street between Kane and Chadwick.

Mr. Andrie, in the late summer, purchased these three buildings from Mrs. Ida Frank of Portland and immediately proceeded with the task of remodeling. The buildings, despite the fact

that they were constructed more than 30 years ago, were substantially built, and are well located for renting purposes. However, they were of such lacking in modern conveniences that it was difficult to secure suitable tenants for them.

Mr. Andrie, at a very small cost, has changed the old two-story buildings into thoroughly modern, stucco cottages, each attractive in architectural style, and thoroughly modern in arrangement and conveniences.

and the Roseburg hotel buildings, the erection of the \$10,000 Texaco service station, the G. E. Foster filling station, construction of cabins at the Roseburg auto camp and the South End auto camp. This classification also included the hoist shed built by the Standard Oil service station on Stephens street, several miniature golf courses, the California Oregon Power company office annex, the Zenor service station and the store building erected by J. A. Cobb on Lane street.

Future Prospects Bright Prospects are believed to be good for the coming year. The early part of the year, it is expected, will be devoted largely to an increased activity in remodeling and repairing existing buildings. The present low cost of materials and labor are a great in-

ducement to the home owner and landlord to make needed improvements. The school census and other estimates on population show a steady increase and few suitable residences in Roseburg are available for rent. Many of the older homes, principally those held for renting purposes, are badly in need of repairs, but with the prospect of an increase in rents with the restoration of normal business conditions, landlords are realizing the importance of having their property in shape to realize the benefits from such condition.

In the event of an early and favorable decision on the soldiers home project, a great increase in building activity is anticipated, as several persons already have plans prepared for construction work if Roseburg is successful in its effort to secure the federal institution.

If you ever liked Lon Chaney in any of his many pictures, don't fail to see "The Unholy Three" at the Indian tonight. Chaney's only talking picture proved to be by far the best of his whole astonishing career. He became not only a man with a thousand faces but also a man with a thousand voices.

"The Unholy Three" is based on a story of a side-show ventriloquist who becomes involved together with a circus giant and midget in an amazing criminal plot. The ventriloquist (Chaney) fools the police by running a pet shot in the

suits. Lumber mills, particularly many of the smaller mills, are resuming operations after long shut-

downs. Lumber stocks are at a lower level than at any time for the past ten years, it is reported, while orders are already mounting to new high levels. Many Douglas county mills are expected to be back in operation within the next few weeks, which will take up a large part of the slack in the unemployment situation.

Highway Projects The coming year, it is expected, will see active work started on the North Umpqua highway to Diamond lake. Money will be available by the super road districts to cooperate with federal funds which are greatly increased this year through emergency appropriations, and it is possible that the completion of the forest road may be greatly advanced during the year. Particularly is this true if Congressman Hawley's bill appropriating \$300,000 for this specific project is passed by congress.

In the southern part of the county everything is in readiness for the completion of the grading of the Tiller-Trail cut-off road, practically finishing that important project, except for surfacing, which can easily be taken care of in the future.

The northern part of the county is also to see the completion of its major highway as a result of the announcement made yesterday regarding the construction of the Hancock mountain tunnel and road grading.

Douglas county has three outstanding major road projects, the Umpqua highway from Drain to Reedsport, the North Umpqua highway to Diamond lake, and the Tiller-Trail cut-off. The year promises to bring the completion of two and important extension of the third.

In Roseburg predictions for the year must, of course, be entirely contingent upon the success of the soldiers' home issue. In the event an early decision is received the city will unquestionably see one of the greatest building programs it has ever known, and there will be an immediate revival of active business and important business and industrial development.

Building Prospects Already in prospect in the 1931 building program is the construction of an egg packing station by the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers. The land has already been purchased and is to be cleared within the next few weeks. It is expected, preparatory to actual construction.

Indications are, also, that there will be a reorganization of the local cannery, and that it will be put

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back into operation during the year to serve the producers of the vicinity, who lost so heavily last year because of its failure.

Crops Outlook Good All agricultural prospects are bright, it is reported. Crop conditions are most favorable, and indications point to very bountiful yields in practically all lines. Sheep men report good range conditions and are expecting a large lamb crop. Prices for farm crops, poultry and livestock appear to be on the upgrade, and will doubtless continue to advance as general business conditions improve.

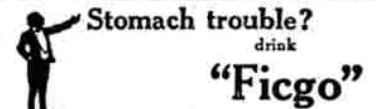
Consequently, the term "Happy New Year" at this time is most appropriate.

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
