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OUTPUT OF OREGON MINES, 1930, LESS THAN 1929 TOTAL

The total value of the gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc produced from lode and placer mines in Oregon in 1930 is estimated at \$309,100, or a decrease of \$176,309, compared with 1929, according to figures prepared by the United States bureau of mines, department of commerce. There were decreases in the output of all metals, with copper recording the largest loss. Western Oregon led in the value of the output of metals, but with the output of a new dredge in eastern Oregon the eastern and western portions of the state were about equally divided as to the gold yield.

The output of copper from mines in Oregon in 1930 is estimated at 161,500 pounds, valued at \$29,100, which is a decrease of about 493,800 pounds in quantity and of about \$95,300 in value, compared with 1929. The largest producer of copper ore was the Queen of Bronze and Coughy property in Josephine county, which ceased production in April owing to the price decline of the metal. Development work also discontinued in October, but operations were expected to be resumed in 1931. Some copper ore was shipped by the Silver Peak Copper Co. from its property near Riddle early in the year and from a nearby property the Empqua Consolidated Co. shipped copper ore to a smelter. The Miller Empqua Copper Co. was incorporated to develop the Rowley property.
